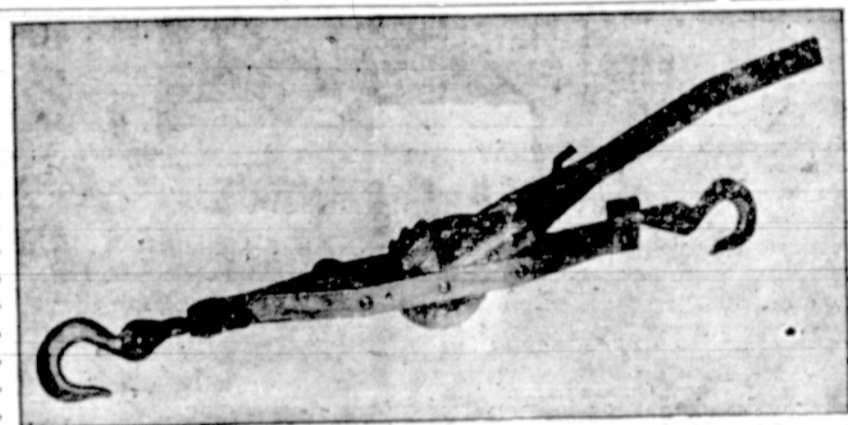
The up-track side of the depot upper story has been removed and some more rooms will be added above the freight room before the job is done.

tee appointed by the president of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League and will be announced as a special feature of that organization's annual meeting in Condon on December 2 to 4.

This announcement was made recently by E. R. Jackman, OSC, extension farm crops specialist, and member of the selection committee. Jackman states a Columbia basin farmer will be named to receive the award on the basis of work he has done in conservation on his own farm.

Ralph McEwen, Haines, president of the wheat league, says in this way his organization hopes to call attention to practical conservation measures that might be undertaken in the Columbia basin area. This section is frequently described as one of the most critical erosion areas in the United States.

Idea for the award was proposed recently by Jackman during a meeting of Columbia basin agricultural conservation association committeemen and soil conservation specialists. The proposal was adopted as part of

a 16 point program to further Columbia basin soil conservation practices. The wheat league, sponsor of recent soil conservation research legislation, will make a suitable award to the farmer selected, McEwen states. One full day of the coming wheat league meeting, McEwen has announced, will be devoted to conservation.

Among points to be considered in making the conservation man-of-the-year selection are positive measures that have been taken by the farmer to control erosion on his own farm during the past year; and the degree in which these practices are applicable to other lands in the area.

In addition to Jackman, members of the selection committee are as follows: Floyd Root, Wasco, chairman; Roy Foreman, Antelope; Charles Nish, Mikkaloo; Frank Anderson, Heppner; Lester King, Pendleton; and Ray Kent, Pendleton.

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLE
BILL AMENDING LICENSING AND ACQUISITION PROVISIONS OF HYDROELECTRIC COMMISSION ACT

PURPOSE: Amending hydroelectric commission act of Oregon requiring commission to set forth the maximum rate of return and amortization in license; providing that state or any municipality thereof shall have right to take over any project at expiration of the original license upon payment of fair value not exceeding net investment; if not taken over, commission may issue license under then existing laws or extend original license according to the terms and conditions of the license period by condemnation.
