## Oregon 4-H'ers Win Chicago Trips

**SUPERIOR** records of achievement in National 4-H Clothing, Food Preparation, Girls' Record and Home Improvement programs have won 1948 state championship honors for four Oregon club members. Each received an all-expense trip to the 27th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 28 to Dec. 2. The winners, who were selected by the state club office, and brief outlines of their records follow:

Getting that well-known "new-look" was little trouble for Joanne Perry, 16, of Portland, who selected, sewed, made over or mended 282 garments for herself and other members of the family in addition to completing 29 4-H projects, of which five were in clothing. Joanne served her club in many offices and is now leader; gave 13 4-H talks at club, community and school meetings and over the radio. Named state winner in the 1948 National 4-H Clothing Achievement program, she was awarded an educational trip to the Chicago Club Congress provided by Spool Cotton Educational Bureau.

If you visited her home in Pilot Rock, you would readily see why Tylene L. Horn, 16, has been named State winner in the 1948 National 4-H Home Improvement program. Tylene made a window seat and a dressing table from orange crates and covered them with cretonne, painted a chair set and four pillow cases with textile paint; embroidered a set of four-sack dish towels, and helped paint the kitchen and living room woodwork. A seven-year 4-H'er, Tylene has completed nine projects, including two in Home Improvement, and has served her local club as secretary. In recognition of her achievements, The Sears-Roebuck Foundation is providing Tylene with an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago.
