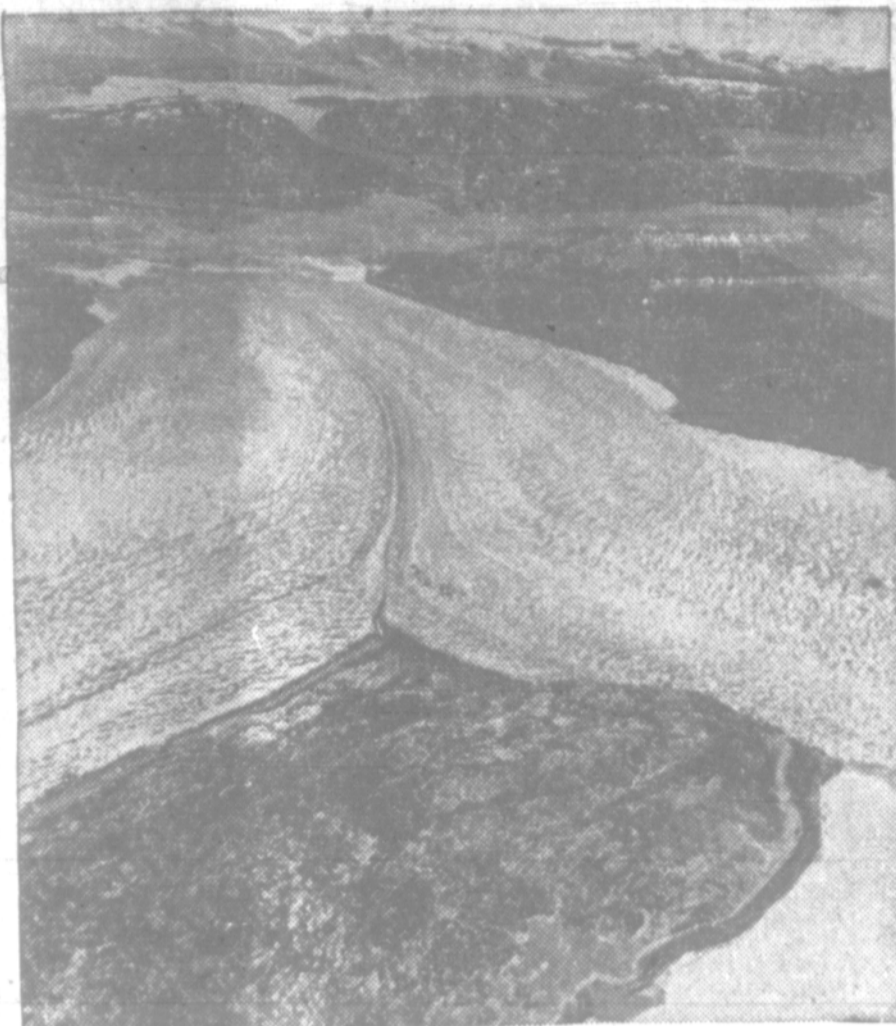

will have to be cleared and prepared for irrigation," the bureau's announcement describes it as "very productive," offering such staple crops as alfalfa, wheat, barley, oats, beans, peas, potatoes and sugar beets. In addition, "cattle raising and dairying are important industries, and hogs and poultry do well."

Personal inquiries regarding the land opening may be made at the Project Land Use and Settlement office, Bureau of Reclamation, Hunt, Idaho.

Each successful applicant will be given two barrack-type frame buildings and war surplus items including small tools, toilet fixtures, tables, chairs, and army blankets.

Assistance in laying out fields and irrigation systems, clearing and leveling land, developing domestic water systems, crop and livestock production and farm building construction will be offered by local, state and federal farm agencies.
