Oregon 4-H'ers Win Special Recognition

SUPERIOR records in 1948 National 4-H Dairy Production, Soil Conservation and Recreation and Rural Arts programs won three Oregon club members special recognition. The winners and brief outlines of their records follow:

Lawrence Allen, 18, of Bend, has been named a sectional 4-H winner as a result of his outstanding achievements in the National 4-H Dairy Production awards program. During 10 years in club work, Lawrence completed 10 dairy projects and developed a herd of 19 Guernsey dairy cattle. He also has learned much about judging and showing dairy cattle as proven by the Helder Division at the County Fair, a first on the Young Breeder's herd and a first and grand champion on his senior cow at the State Fair, and a first and grand champion of the 4-H Guernsey at the Pacific International. In recognition of his achievements in dairy production, Lawrence was awarded an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, provided by the Kraft Foods Company.

Henry Jaeger, 18, of Condon received the State winner's award for outstanding achievement in the 1948 National 4-H Soil Conservation awards program. Henry put into practice such soil saving and building operations as strip farming, terracing, building check dams and diversion ditches, and planting vegetation in eroded gullies. An eight-year 4-H'er, Henry has served his local club as president, leader and secretary. In recognition of his achievements, he has been given a \$50.00 U. S. Savings Bond, provided by Firestone.

Promoting recreational and handicraft work has brought State recognition to Marjorie Davidson, 17, of Bend. Her record will be judged to determine the eight national winners in the 1948 National 4-H Recreation and Rural Arts program.

Objectives of the program are to assist 4-H members in developing cultural and recreational opportunities in their homes and communities, to help 4-H members develop a higher appreciation of rural arts; make 4-H programs more attractive and self-satisfying and teach members to lead recreational activities. Each of the counties having an outstanding recreational program received a \$25.00 cash award, provided by United States Rubber Company.

All of these activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

Between 4:30 and 6:30 p.m., eliminate all space heating by electricity; in so far as possible, serve oven meals prepared in advance of 4:30 p.m. and confine surface cooking to the fewest possible units; wash dishes and bathe after 6:30 p.m.; restrict washing and ironing to the morning or after 6:30 p.m.; turn off all lights not actually needed between 4:30 and 6:30 p.m.

INDUSTRY...

Between 4:30 and 6:30 p.m., reduce use of electrically operated machinery and equipment to a minimum; eliminate pumping, air conditioning and all ornamental and less essential lighting except as necessary for safety.

BUSINESS MAN...

Turn off or reduce to a minimum all window display and ornamental lights between 4:30 and 6:30 p.m. Reduce air conditioning during these hours. Reduce use of electrically operated equipment after 6:30 p.m. Cut use of outdoor and indoor electric signs and lighting to minimum between 4:30 and 6:30 p.m.
