BREAKFAST WAKE-UPS

Having trouble getting the family up these cold mornings? After the gay round of holiday festivities and the luxury of sleeping late, it is hard to get the family back on schedule! One of the best wake-ups we know of to help this situation is to have a hearty appetizing breakfast ready when Dad and the children gather round the table. The savory fragrance of frying bacon or spicy coffeecake wafting from the kitchen through the house will do more to rouse sleepyheads than the most urgent shaking.

With a little planning and forethought breakfast can be changed from a monotonous task to a cheerful friendly gathering. Breakfast is an important meal, too, nutritionally speaking. It should supply one-third of the day's food requirements as well as prepare the body for the day's activities. As for the breakfast menu, there is really an endless variety if you stop to think about it. Breakfast doesn't have to be fancy, but it should be adequate. Fruit, a hot dish such as cereal, eggs, bacon, hot breads or toast, butter, milk and coffee, can be combined in many different ways to make an appetizing meal.

Hot breads are especially tempting these cold mornings, and are very little extra trouble if the dry ingredients are measured and sifted the night before. Both the recipes below may be prepared this way.

Individual Coffee Cakes

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 1/2 cups cake flour, sifted
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt

Mix dry ingredients. Add beaten eggs, milk and melted butter, mixing quickly. Pour into buttered muffin tins, filling about two-thirds full. Top each muffin with a mixture made with 3 Tbsp sugar, 1 tsp cinnamon and 4 Tbsp chopped nuts. Bake in moderate oven 375 degrees, 20 to 30 minutes. Yields 12.

Ginger Cheese Muffins

- 2 cups flour
- 3 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp soda
- 1/2 tsp ginger
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 beaten egg
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 4 Tbsp melted butter
- 3/4 cup grated cheese

Sift dry ingredients together. Beat egg well and gradually add it to the milk, then molasses. Slowly add the liquid mixture to the dry ingredients, stirring constantly. When smooth, add melted shortening and fold in grated cheese. Half fill greased muffin tins with mixture and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, 15 to 20 minutes. Serve hot with butter. Makes 16 muffins.
