DIVIDEND DECLARED BY FIRST NATIONAL BANK
Directors of the First National Bank of Portland today declared a dividend of \$360,000.00 constituting \$1.00 per share on all outstanding stock of the bank. It is payable at two periods: fifty cents payable on April first to shareholders of record March 25 and fifty cents payable on July first to shareholders of record at the close of business June 24.
The new dividend rate shows an increase of 25% or 20c per share for the first half of the year over dividends of recent years. If the rate is maintained by an equivalent dividend later in the year it will place First National Bank stock on a \$2.00 per year basis.
