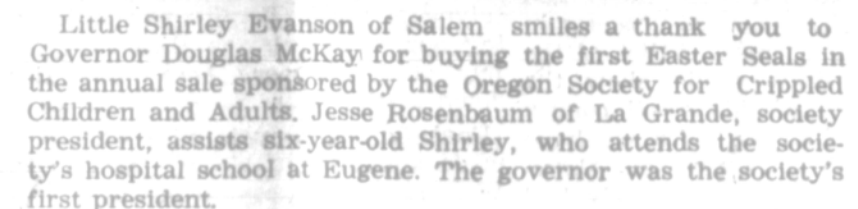


Now something will have to be done within the next two years or the 1951 legislature will end the monopoly.
