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FEPC BILL

For years the politicians have kept alive the struggle between the whites and the blacks through some sort of anti-discrimination bill which restaurant and hotel owners always fought with gusto and success. One can only wonder if the white and the black would not get along better if there were no politicians to play upon each

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for their selfish purposes. This time the FEPC (fair employment practices commission) has been passed by the senate. It is different from the original which provided for a commission and an appropriation. Certainly a commission with money would see to it that there would be discrimination to manage. On it would be some of those who professionally and profitably bleed and die for the minority groups concerned. Also it would be hard to by-pass the do-gooders on such

a commission, especially the feminine type of do-gooders which is considered the more virulent of the species.

The senate did away with the commission and followed the New York law pretty well. Reports are that the law works well back in New York where there have been few appeals about employment under it.

Now it seems likely that the house will also pass some sort of a law. It is political and is being done by the parties as a party measure in order to get the Negro vote. That is the only reason why it is going to be passed—only a few think it will do any good, or that conditions will be improved thereby.

There may be other legislation similar to this as the parties become more nearly equal in Oregon. Each will be jockeying for votes and this will cause more speed in social changes that are thought to be vote-getters.

Promotion of County Agent Le Roy Wright to a bigger job at Baker will make necessary a change for Sherman county. Mr. Wright is well-prepared for the work at Baker which is largely a stock county and his work has been with stock while here.

During the 11 1/2 years Mr. Wright has been county agent of this county 4-H club boys and girls have made great progress in beef club work. A list of the championships would show the superiority of this small county in beef club work for we have won much more than our share. It is a record that probably had much to do with Wright's selection by cow-minded Baker county.

Not only must the show and sale record of the children be placed at the door of the county agent, but the increase in cattle numbers within the county is his achievement as well. Twelve years ago there were very few purebred cattle here; now there are hundreds and a successful sale distributes them each year.

There may be a lapse in county agent work because it will take a new man some time to become acquainted with the work. But Wright has earned the promo-

tion. By promoting county agents to better jobs is about the only way of rewarding the good ones. We congratulate him.

And we also hope that the new county agent will enter into community and county life as actively, will buy property and be one of us as fully as Wright has done.

Lower Death Rate Despite Winter Roads

Despite state-wide weather condition which made travel extremely hazardous throughout much of the month, Oregon's gasoline sales in January were only eight percent below those of January last year, according to the motor fuels tax collection report of the state department.

Taxable sales for the month totalled 27,251,017 gallons compared with 29,091,728 a year ago. Gross gasoline taxes were \$1,362,550.83, of which approximately 13 percent will be returned to non-highway users as refunds.

Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry pointed out that although mileage was not seriously curtailed, the careful driving enforced by weather and road conditions resulted in a drastic cut in traffic deaths. Only 12 lives were lost in January highway mishaps, compared with 32 in December and 27 in January of 1948.

Fatality rate for the month is estimated at 3.8 deaths per hundred million miles of driving. Newbry said this figure, representing fatal risk in terms of exposure, is well below any previous month since 1935, when accurate figures were first recorded. Death rate for 1948 was 7.6.

SYMPTOMS OF HEART TROUBLE

Diseases or disturbances of the heart produce no sensations which can be felt until a condition of heart failure arises or the threshold of sensitivity in the individual falls low enough to allow heart action to be brought into consciousness. One can have structural changes in the heart without producing any symptoms and one may have considerable discomfort with no real heart damage.

Symptoms will develop when the heart can no longer do its full work of maintaining circulation. These symptoms can be caused in regions very remote from the heart, as the more distant part the more efficient must be the heart to maintain that parts circulation. To list all possibilities of symptoms which could be produced by a failing heart would be to list practically all human symptomatology from heartaches thru chest distress, abdominal distress, to pain or swelling in the extremities.

As a rule the more local the symptoms about the heart area the more apt are these symptoms to be caused by a functional reaction. The more distant the symptoms the more apt are they to be caused by real heart inefficiency due to disease.

In general the most common symptoms encountered are shortness of breath, chest pain, palpitation and edema (swelling of the ankles). However, any of these symptoms can be produced by many other causes than heart disease and in themselves would not indicate heart disease. It is the progression of symptoms, the order of development, the correlation of physical findings in the body and the relation of these symptoms to effort, eating, emotional strain, and the like that must be used in the analysis.

If one be fearful of some such symptoms your doctor should be consulted to make such an analysis. The fear of heart disease, in itself can produce symptoms and constant fear makes one more miserable than to know the truth and learn to take care of an abnormal condition.

Dizziness, faintness, sighing respiration, tenderness in the area of the heart and palpitation, while occasionally found with organic heart disease, are more commonly expressions of functional disturbances. Your family doctor can decide these questions in 90% of all cases without the need of expensive apparatus or specialists examinations.
