**History Sherman County**

west of Grass Valley settling near Tilford Moore, first owner of the upper Buckley place. The Fulton family moved from Wasco county in 1878 and began raising horses and cattle and buying land to start the several Fulton estates of this day.

There were others, some who stayed and some who left. Henry Barnum, who had worked for the stage company took up land in Barnum canyon in 1868 and unwittingly established the town of Moro.

What fences there were were ditch fences made by plowing a deep furrow and piling the dirt on the outside of the enclosure so stock could jump with difficulty if at all. Some of Barnum's ditch can still be traced near Moro.

Actually there were few cattle in the country for the great expanse of feed available and there were almost no houses of consequence. Cattlemen had camps but these were subject to change. It was still an unsettled country as this story by Carson Masiker will indicate.

"John Galligher ran a pack train in the early sixties between The Dalles and the new gold camp of Canyon City. In 1864 he was murdered by Jim Berrilway and his body was hidden. Theodore Burmister found the body and Berrilway was arrested at Canyon City. There was no grant county at that time so a mass meeting was called to administer justice instead of sending the culprit to The Dalles, county seat of Wasco county.

A judge was elected, a sheriff and prosecuting attorney and a jury was impaneled. A lawyer was paid \$60 to defend Berrilway who was tried, convicted and sentenced to be hung within two days. The miners bought a suit for \$60 for Berrilway to be hung in.

Mrs. Galligher in The Dalles heard of the case and sent a cousin of Galligher's, Mike Galligher, to Canyon City to settle the estate. He sold the train and started back to The Dalles on horse back in company with Cayuse George, who was carrying the mail.

Now to quote: "Somewhere between Ferry Canyon on John Day and Ferry Canyon on Deschutes Galligher's saddle became loose and he stopped to tighten the girth. While he was doing this, Cayuse George passed on over a hill and out of sight. Mike, who was a barber by trade, had always lived in the city and was utterly lost. He wandered about for four days between the two rivers and did not strike the road.

"He then killed his horse but had no matches and could not build a fire to cook the meat and his stomach rejected it. He then wandered one day on foot. By this time, he decided that he could eat raw horse but he hunted two days in vain for the horse. He then abandoned the hunt and tried to find his way out. On the evening of

his seventh day of fasting, he struck a fresh wagon track and followed it until dark. It brought him to the camp of Samuel Price and William Masiker in Grass Valley, where Dr. Rollins afterward settled.

"Mike's foot was horribly blistered and all that he had eaten during the seven days of his wanderings was the bark from a few roots he had pulled out of the ground. Price and Masiker had been out to Buck Creek (Buck Hollow) for a load of wood. They brought Mike in with them to Sand Spring."

Jay Price, born at the Love place in 1886 son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Price, writes of early day stage lines that traversed Sherman county saying that in the early sixties a man named Biglow had a contract to carry mail from The Dalles to Umasilla.

"In 1864 the road was built from the Deschutes by way of Price's station and on to the John Day and the old Emigrant road was used no more. And soon John Haley ran a stage line from The Dalles to Boise, Idaho. In 1868 Haley sold to the Northwestern Stage company. They extended the line to Kelton, Utah. It was then that the famous Concord coaches were first used on this line. This stage line was in operation until the railroad was built.
