Mrs. Daisy Byers and Miss Evelyn Christianson were weekend visitors in Portland.

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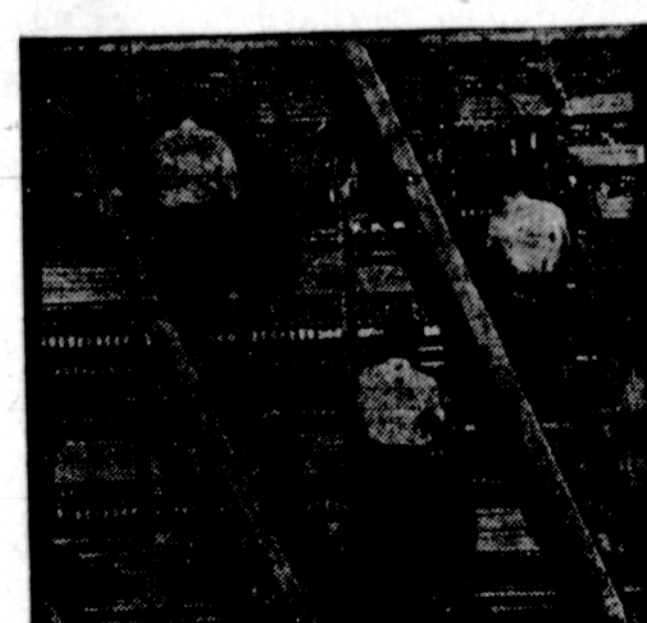
