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PAY STILL AVAILABLE

Mustering out pay is still available to World War II veterans discharged from service prior to Feb. 3, 1944, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs reported this week.

The state veterans' agency said there are numerous eligible veterans, or next of kin of deceased veterans, who have not applied to the army or navy for this benefit. The deadline is February 3, 1950.

Survivors may apply in those cases where the veteran was separated from service before his death and prior to February 3, 1944. Survivors are also entitled to unpaid installments in case of separation after February 3, 1944. The benefit is not payable to survivors of those who died in service.
