**How 'safety-circle' driving cuts down accidents**

"Know your safety-circle!" is an important lesson taught Standard of California drivers... and perhaps it can be helpful to you.

Your safety-circle is the distance you need to meet an emergency situation—a car stopping suddenly ahead, for example. Our drivers get a special test which tells them exactly how fast they react, but in general, it takes the average person a full second to see a hazard, think what to do and act. So, driving on a clear road, at 30 miles an hour, you should stay at least 7 car lengths behind the car ahead; when you drive 45 miles an hour, stay behind 15 car lengths.
