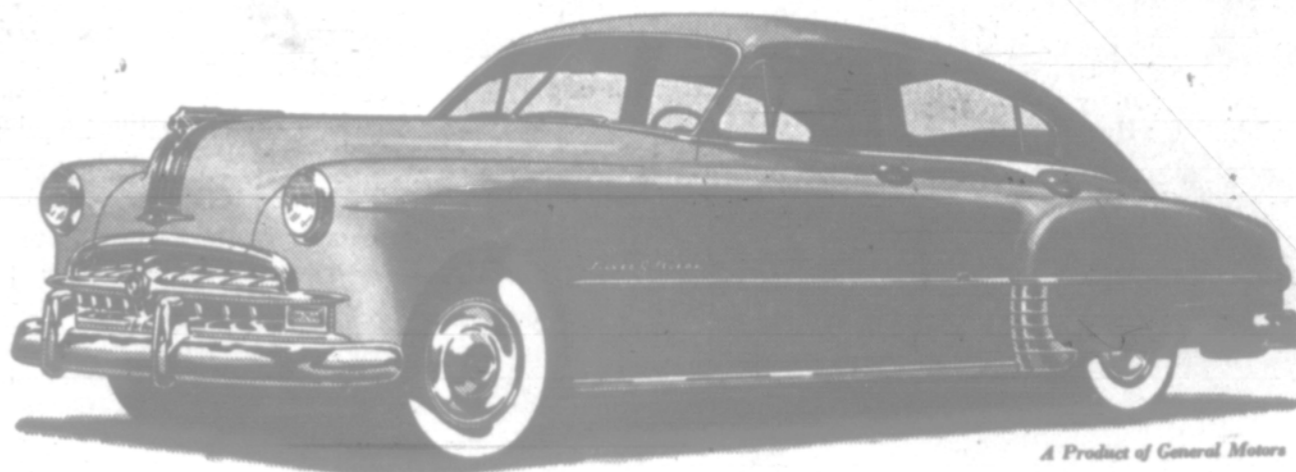
Word from E. V. Burns, Portland, district manager, indicated

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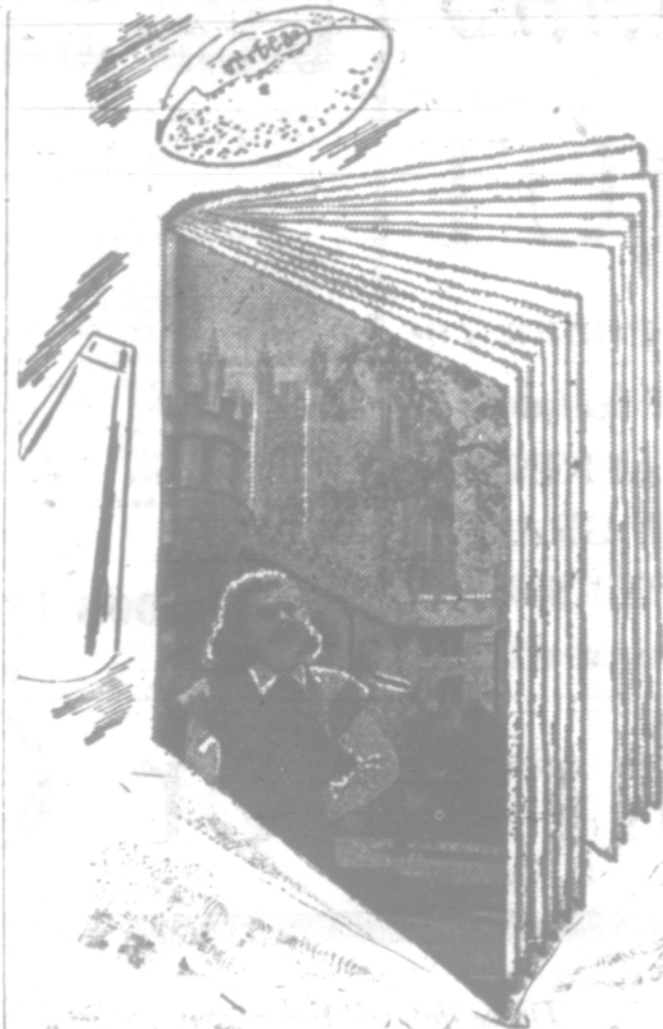
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
