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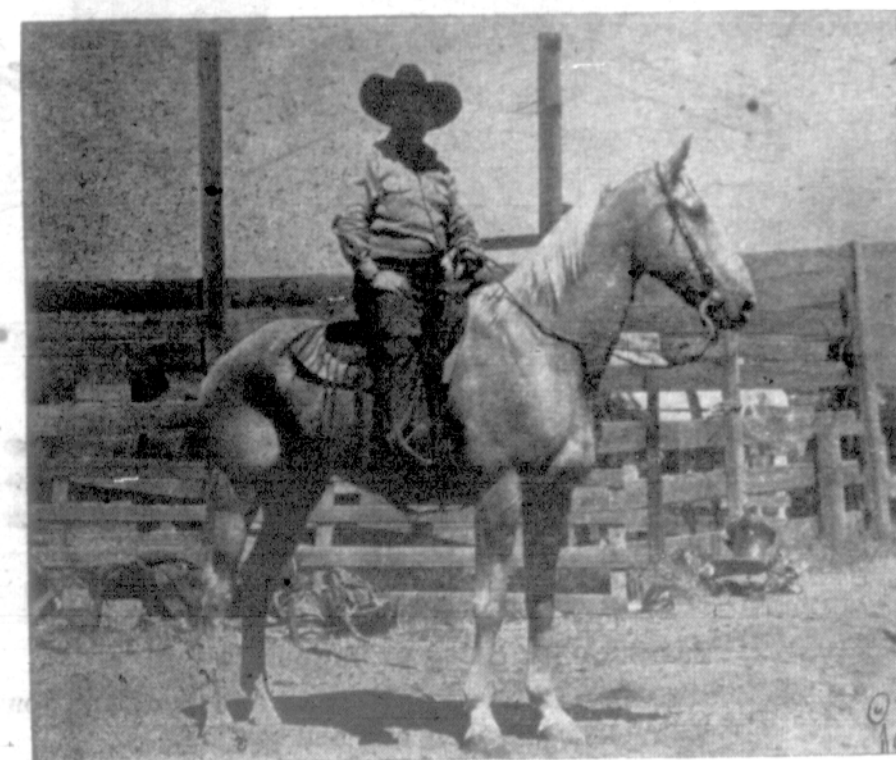
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Sherman County Fair Sept. 15-18

You can see it at Pendleton, Calgary and Cheyenne and this year you can get your thrills at the fair grounds on the hill.

You won't want to miss a minute of it so bring both eyes.

The Rodeo is probably the most popular means of crowd entertainment in America, at least in western America. People like to see the buckers.

This year the fair association has engaged the services of Mack Barber, well known to Sherman county audiences, who will bring his string of buckers here for Saturday and Sunday of the fair.

Mack has some fine buckers and either fills the programs at the big shows or helps furnish the stock for them. He has been in the business many, many years and has had bucking horses and a good bunch of men to ride them.

Of great interest to the crowd is that Mack is always ready to put a horse out of the chute. There is no waiting for Mack to get the rigging on a horse or to let him out before the eye of

the spectators. Mack's a showman.

Bucking doesn't make up all of a rodeo. No Sir! There's got to be a lot of other stuff in addition.

This year the fair board bought the whole show.

There will be Brahma bulls to torment the riders, bareback bucking, calf roping, in fact the events that make a rodeo anywhere from the smallest western town to Madison Square Garden. It will be a real one.
