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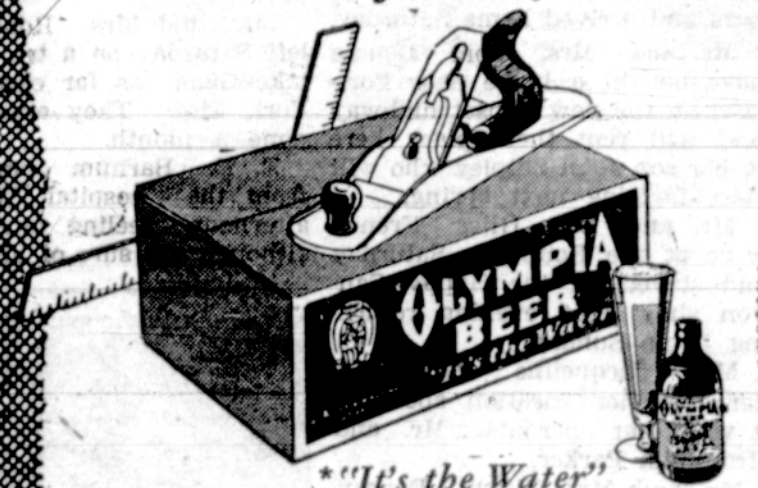

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HORSE RACES

They did a lot for amusement hereabouts, and a lot for the Sherman County Fair.

Remember VanWinkle and Whistling Bill and Crosfield and the many more later ones, and their horses runners, pacers, trotters that had reputations in olden days and paved the way for us.

There's going to be horse races at the Sherman County Fair. That wouldn't surprise anyone because for years the horse races have been one of the best features of the fair program. It really wouldn't be a fair without horse races, especially the kind of horse races held here.

Most of the horses are locally owned and everybody knows the owner and often as not knows the horses as well. It's more fun to watch Bill's horse run than to watch one from Calumet farms go around the track.

The race program will be much the same as always with some pony races, saddle horse races, half and three-eighths mile races. In fact, any race program is like another in that they run races of varying distances with different horses. So that's OK.

Probably there's nothing quite so exciting as horse racing. As a sport it has lasted for generations and centuries. They were racing horses back in Roman days (remember Ben Hur) and long before that. It is the sport of Kings and the king of sports.

There should be lots of horses this year because the Mid-Columbia horse show boys and girls will be here for their own program Friday and will remain over to race Saturday and Sunday. There's racing Friday, too, you know. Some of these fancy Dan horses of the parades and games are pretty fast on foot.

The fair board and the marshals have learned how to get the horses on the track in good order now and there is seldom delay in getting the races off, less delay, really, than on the bigger tracks where the betting slows things up and where there is nothing else to watch between races.

Well, it will be a good show with the crowds yelling their heads off as the bay and the black come around the last turn into the stretch with the lead changing every jump. Don't let anything keep you away.
