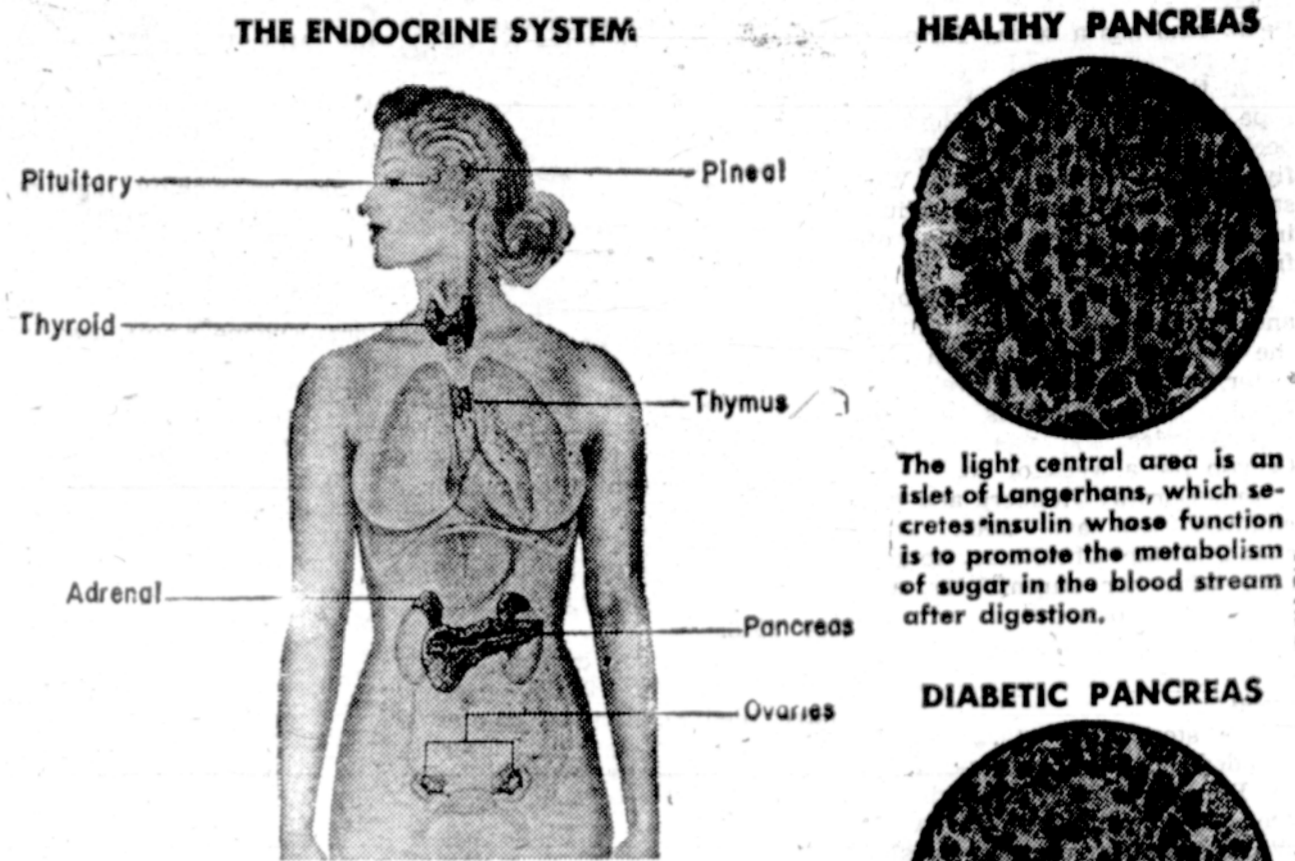

The Human Hormone Factory



The glands of internal secretion presently recognized are those shown in this "soft x-ray" drawing by Paul Peck, well-known medical artist. Only recently has the pancreas been included in this company—it having been established that insulin, the substance formed by the islets of Langerhans in the pancreas, is a true hormone. The products of all these glands are vital to full development and complete health (though the thymus begins a slow process of atrophy after babyhood). Each gland or pair of glands secretes into the blood stream one or more hormones, each having a specific function and—it is assumed—each affecting directly or indirectly functioning of other endocrine glands.

HEALTHY PANCREAS



The light central area is an islet of Langerhans, which secretes insulin whose function is to promote the metabolism of sugar in the blood stream after digestion.

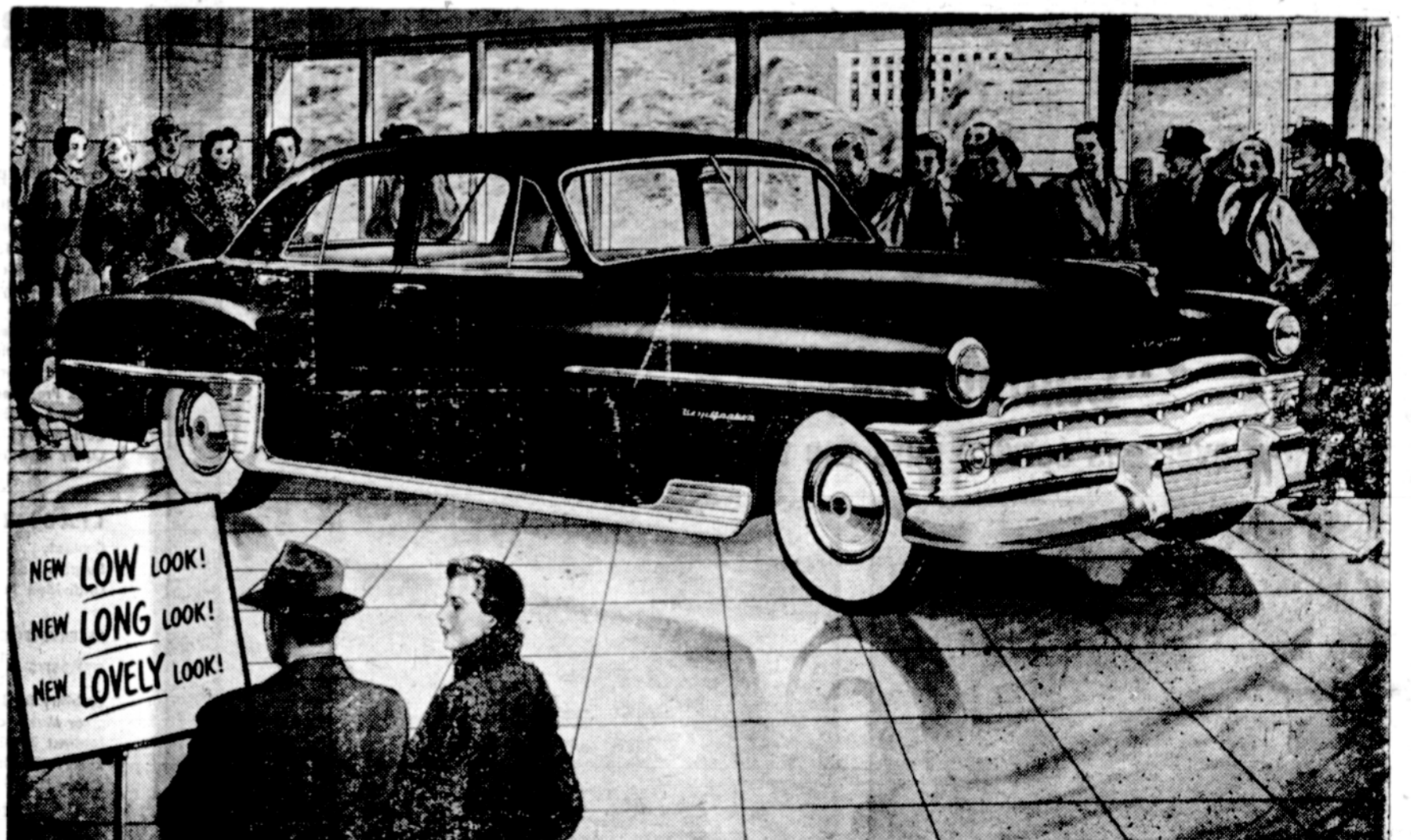
