George Fox attended a rural school board meeting in Moro Wednesday and was also present at the Sherman County

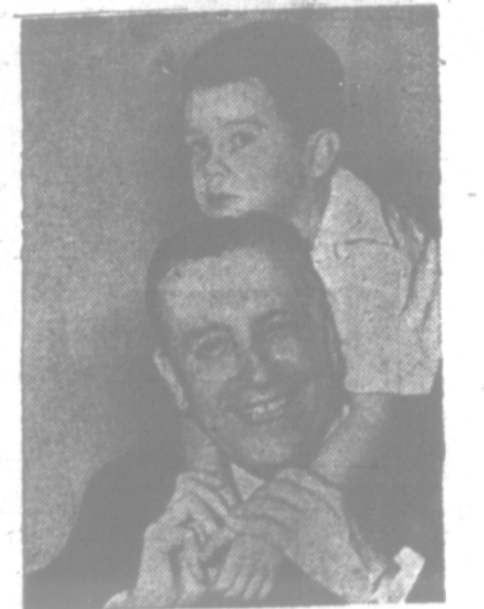
