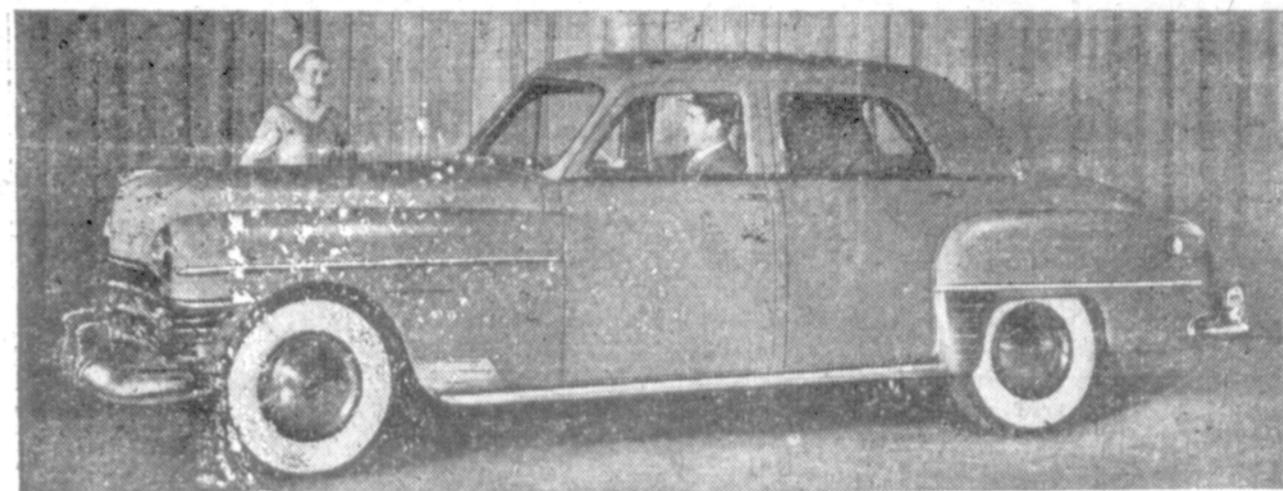

### Oil To Come To Northwest In Pipe

Award of two contracts for construction of an oil products pipe line from Boise, Idaho to Pasco, Washington, was announced today by C. E. Finney, Jr., president of the Salt Lake Pipe Line company.

Morrison-Knudson Company, Inc., Macco Corporation, and Bechel Corporation will build the section from Boise to Baker. The northern portion of the line, from Baker to Pasco, will be built by Pacific Pipeline and Engineers, Ltd.

The installation will be 240-mile extension of the Salt Lake-Boise line begun last year by the Salt Lake Pipe Line Company, a Standard Oil Company of California subsidiary, to transport oil products to the Northwest area from a refinery at Salt Lake City. The first leg, to Twin Falls, was opened to service early this month.
