Turkish Professors Study Wheat Problem

Two professors, Drs. Vamik Taysi and Osman Tuson, from the Agronomy department at the University of Ankara in Turkey, have been visiting the Sherman branch experiment station this week. They are touring the United States to see and learn American agriculture and experimental methods.

Much of the wheat producing areas of Turkey are very similar to the Columbia basin in temperatures, precipitation, and land topography.

The greatest difference is in the soil. The soils of Turkey are heavier and have more lime deposits. They are lacking in phosphates rather than nitrogen. Fire destroyed two stacks, about fifty ton, of meadow and alfalfa hay on the O. N. Ruggles ranch south of Grass Valley about noon Thursday. Orville Ruggles cleaned the meadow and was burning the trash about one hundred yards from the stacks. Mrs. Ruggles was getting dinner on the table and looked out and saw the smoke. She asked her husband if he had had a fire-up at the stacks and he said yes, but did not go to look and in a few minutes when she looked out again the stacks were on fire. They called town and the neighbors for help and about twenty-five men

responded to the call but with the strong west wind it was impossible to save them. No insurance was carried on the hay. Mr. and Mrs. O. N. Ruggles had been gone only a while as they went to The Dalles to attend the funeral of Chester Smith, and did not know of the fire until they got home.

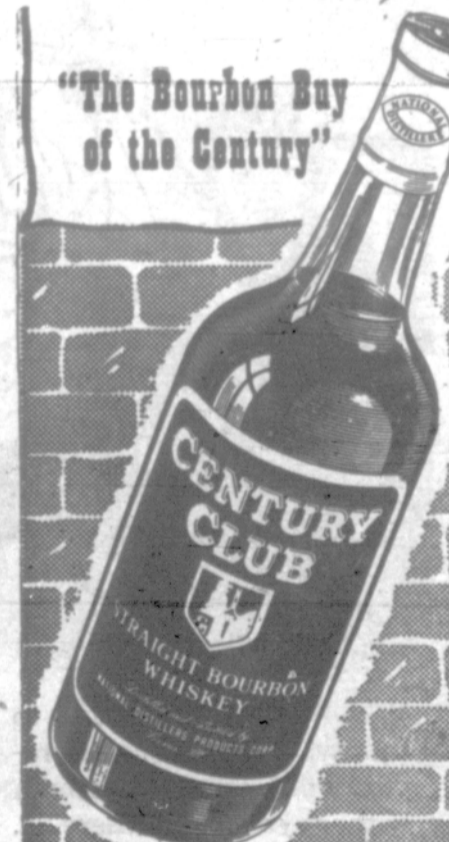
