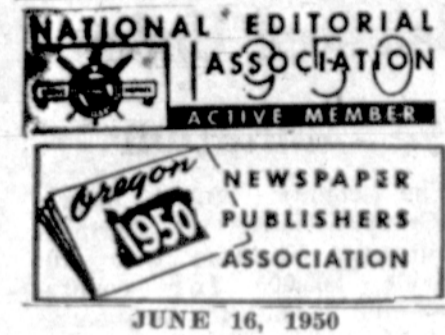

EDUCATIONAL SURVEY
In Oregon there is an interim committee, named from legislative members and the public, to investigate elementary and secondary education in Oregon. Appalled at the size of the job the committee hired an expert who in turn hired some other experts who are making the survey. The outline of what the experts are hoping to do is inclusive and, if fully filled out, will be a comprehensive report.

The finances of the schools come in for much study and the material things connected with education for much study and the quality of education will get some attention.

In fact the division between the material things affecting education and the education itself are referred to as the quantitative and qualitative. The quantitative part includes the buildings, the gymnasiums, the lights, the libraries, etc. It is admitted that it is easier to weigh or compute the value of these than of the qualitative. The qualitative has to do with the achievements made by children under the system. It has to do with the quality of the education given.

That nomenclature is not so bad although it is the lingo of an analyst instead of the plain words of plain men.

It is expected that the committee will finish compiling the value of Oregon's school buildings and the standard of its laboratories and libraries before delving into the much harder job of finding out how much education is obtained from their use. In fact, it may be doubted if the committee ever decides how much education Oregon's children are getting because there are no rules whereby an

education can be measured. We are trying valiantly to the tune of \$73,000,000 a year here in Oregon to provide an education for elementary and secondary school children. If we knew what we were trying to teach and how much and how we might make some progress. However, as long as we continue to judge the quality of an education by the magnificence of the building in which the progress goes on, we will be on the wrong track.

This is not to say that the committee will do no good. There is a good opportunity for it to accomplish definite results. This is to say that a study of education itself would be more valuable.

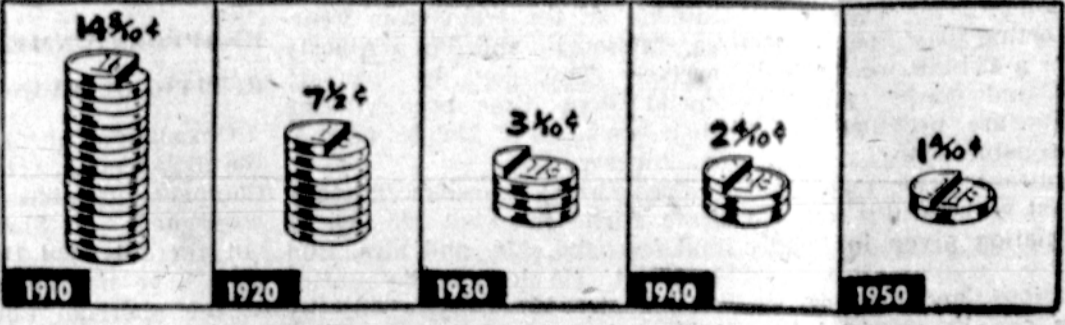
