**SCHOOL TEACHERS WANTED**

An examination for Elementary teachers in the Bureau of Indian Affairs was announced today by the U. S. Civil Service Commission. The positions to be filled pay \$3,100 a year, and are located in Indian schools in several states and Alaska.

Applicants for this examination will not be required to take a written test. To qualify, they must show successful completion of a full 4-year course leading to a degree from an accredited college or university, including or supplemented by 24 semester hours in education of which 12 semester hours must be in elementary education.
