

No Marketing Quotas

There will be no marketing quotas for the 1951 wheat crop. This announcement by the Secretary of Agriculture on June 26 is based on provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended. E. Harvey Miller, chairman of the Oregon State PMA committee, explains. The current wheat crop is estimated at 845 millions, and the carryover from last year is

estimated at 450 million bushels, a total of 1,395 million bushels. This is 18 percent more than the normal supply—the estimated amount needed for domestic consumption and export. Marketing quotas for wheat must be proclaimed when the total supply exceeds the normal supply by more than 20 percent. Wheat export possibilities for the July 1, 1950—June 30, 1951 crop year are estimated at about 325 million bushels—490 million for food, about 130 million for feed and 80 million for seed.

Post Stretching Demonstration Made

A traveling wood preservation exhibit, to be known as the "post stretcher," which will be shown for the first time at a conservation tour and range re-seeding and equipment demonstration in Lake county early in August, has been scheduled thus far to be shown at 25 county fairs and farm meetings, announces Chas. R. Ross, Oregon State college extension forestry specialist. Exhibit may be at the Sherman County Fair.

achloraphenol, copper naphenate, and oil-gas cresote will be shown in the exhibit which includes actual soaking tanks. In the exhibit also will be a heart-wood oak post which is known to be more than 100 years old. Including also will be photographs taken of posts from the T. J. Starker post farm near Corvallis. At this farm, posts are studied to determine their service life. Among fence posts which have on untreated life of 10 years or less are cottonwood, Douglas fir, and western hemlock. For a cost of 14 to 20 cents a post using the cold soaking treatment with a chemical such as "penta" the life of a post can be extended materially.

Methods of Insect Pest Control Reviewed

Annually 300 million bushels of grain are destroyed in the United States by insect pests says Thompson, county extension agent. Sherman county likewise has its loss caused by such insects as bran bug and weevil. A relatively small expenditure of time and money will prevent insect damage to stored grain. Wheat infested with weevil or other injurious insects is docked severely by buyers. Here are the A, B, Cs that will aid in reducing insect damage to grain stored on the farm; First, clean storage bins thoroughly. Be sure that all grain from last year's crop has been removed from cracks and floors since it is a possible source of insect contamination. The surrounding area should likewise be cleaned. Then, spray, using a 5 percent DDT emulsion spray. For best results, Thompson recommends that it be applied at the rate of one gallon of spray to each 1000 square feet of bin area. After grain has been placed in the bin, it is also a good idea to inspect it periodically to see if insects are present.

lege extension entomologist, recommends two fumigants for use in cases where insects are present in grain. They are a mixture of ethylene dichloride and carbon tetrachloride or chloropicrin. Feed and seed stores or chemical supply houses stock both chemicals. About 6 to 8 gallons of fumigant are required for each 1,000 bushels of grain. Fumigation is accomplished by sprinkling or spraying the chemical over the top of grain bins. Since both gases are dangerous, it is advisable to wear a gas mask.
