The sage eradication demonstration held two years ago at Valley Falls.

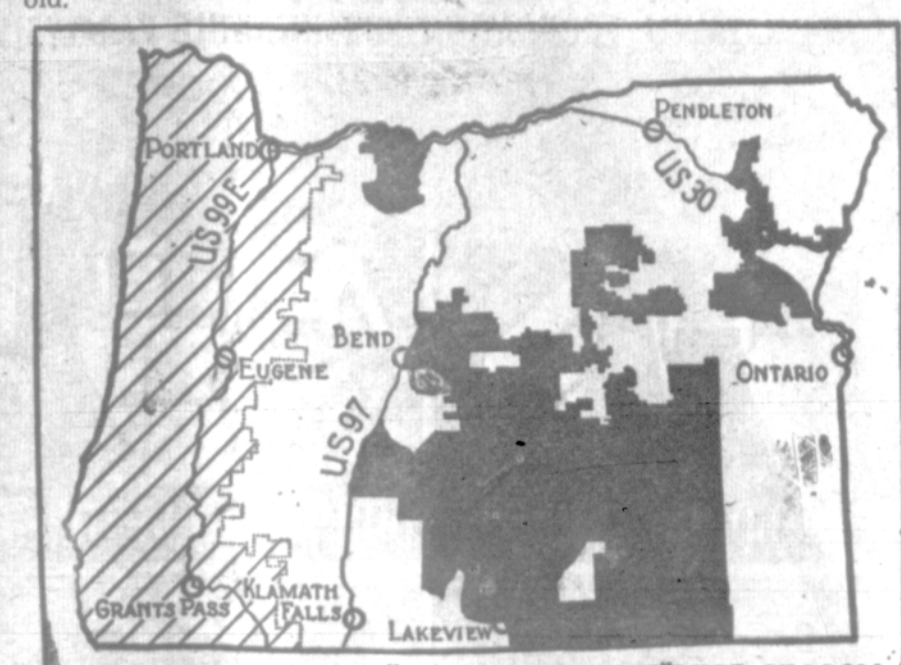

Earl Hoag Selling Hereford Herd

Oregon's famed Hoag Hereford Ranch herd will be dispersed at auction September 7 at the ranch near Blalock, it was announced today by Earl and Maude Hoag, owners.

This registered Hereford sale will mark the dispersal of one of Oregon's outstanding herds. Hoag's animals are exceptionally strong in bloodlines of the immortal WRR Royal Domino 51st, one of the greatest of all Hereford sires.

The dispersal, Hoag said, will include 116 cows, all bred, 70 calves at foot and three excellent herd sires.

Among Hoag's purchases at the Trout Creek sales were the bulk of the top-selling females. In the J. R. Morton dispersion, Lostine, Oregon, he bought such animals as the \$1,500 OJR Princess Domino 4th by WRR Double Royal 51st and the \$950 Lady Real 198th by Real Prince Domino 83rd.

In early June of this year, Hoag sold 38 cows and one herd sire in a special consignment sale at Ontario. This leaves for

the dispersion only the most select animals, he pointed out. "I am reluctant to disperse my fine herd," Hoag said. "But extensive business obligations and the operation of my 8,000 acre wheat ranch make it necessary to take this action."
