Bids will be received until the hour of 5 o'clock p. m. on the 5th day of September, 1950, by the undersigned, and opened thereafter by the City Council at the Council Chambers in the City Hall of Moro, Oregon, at a regular meeting of the City Council on such day, for the purpose of selling the \$8,000.00 issue of CITY OF MORO GENERAL OBLIGATION STREETS AND DRAINS IMPROVEMENT BONDS authorized at an election held on June 3, 1950, said bonds to be numbered 1 to 8, inclusive, in denominations of \$1,000.00 each, to be dated September 1, 1950, and to mature serially in numerical order at the rate of \$1,000.00 on the first day of January in each of the years 1955 to 1962, inclusive, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed 6% per annum. 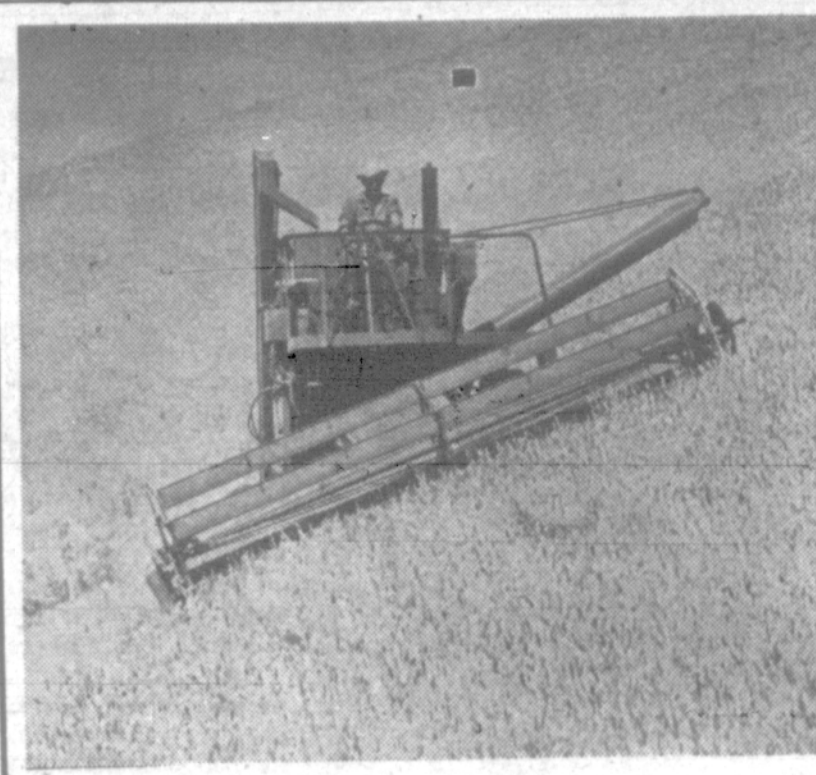

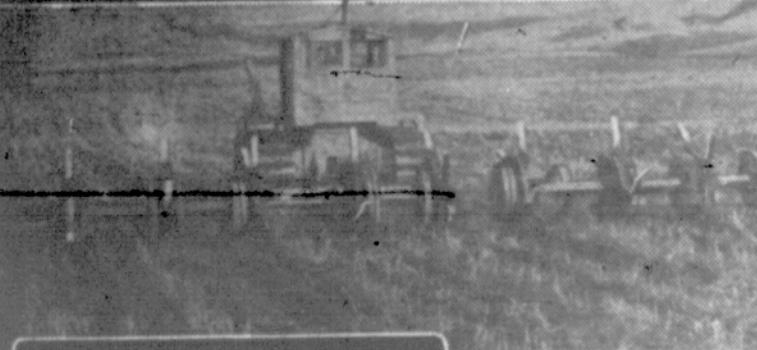

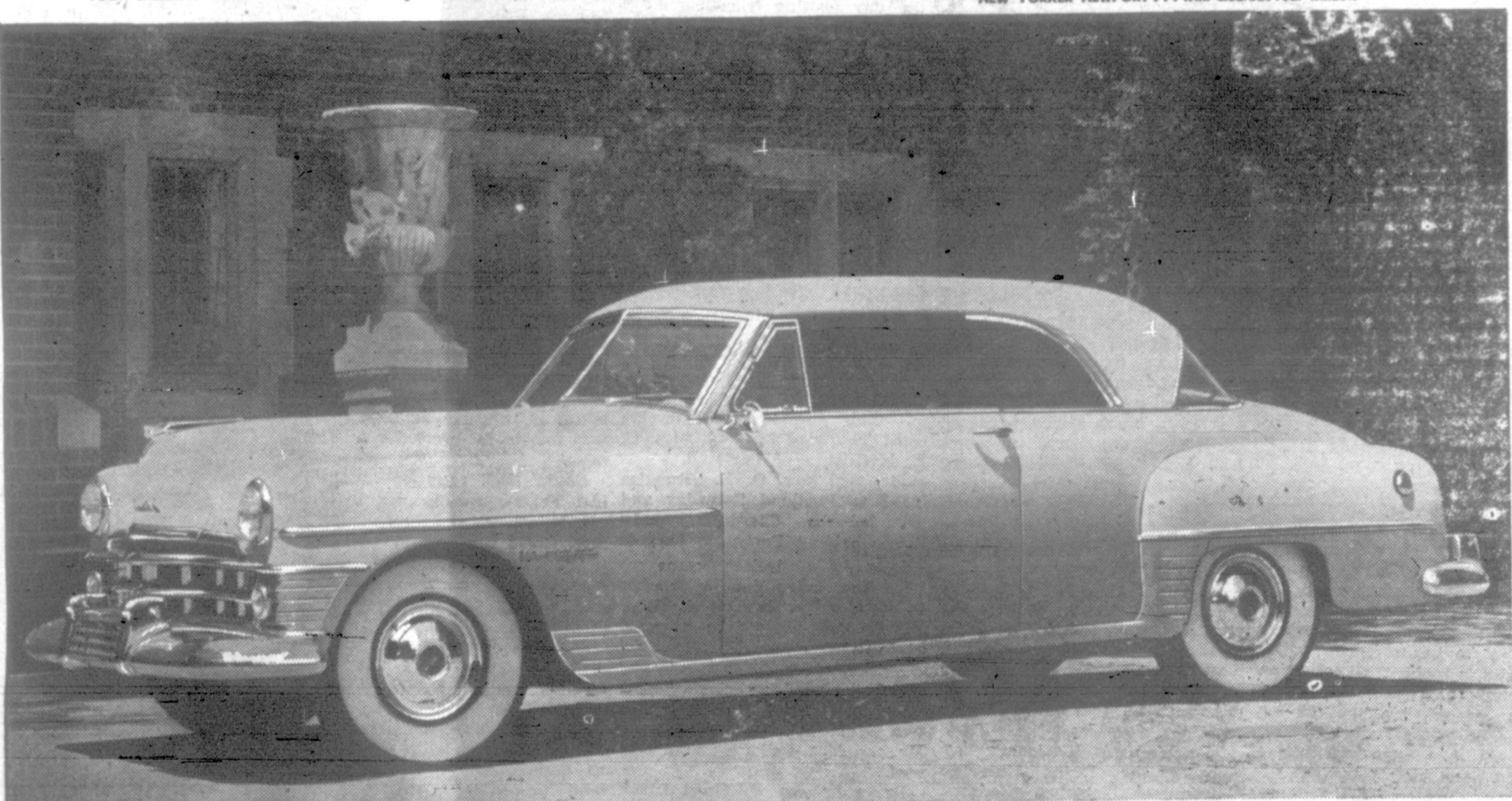
