Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Blaylock and Mrs. T. M. Rolfe went to Goldendale Saturday where they attended the Klickitat county fair.

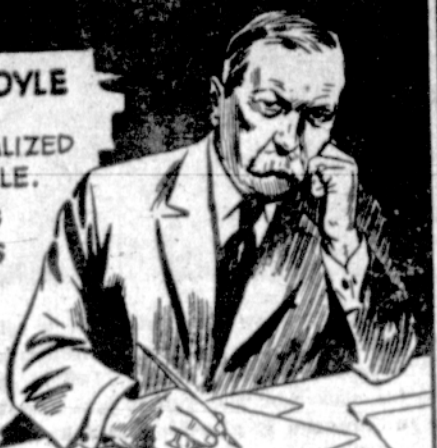

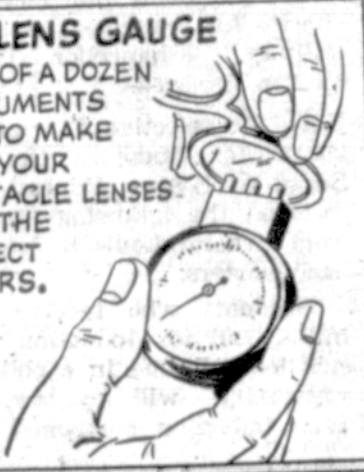
SIR ARTHUR CONAN DOYLE
