Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Schilling were dinner guests Monday at the Art Schilling home.

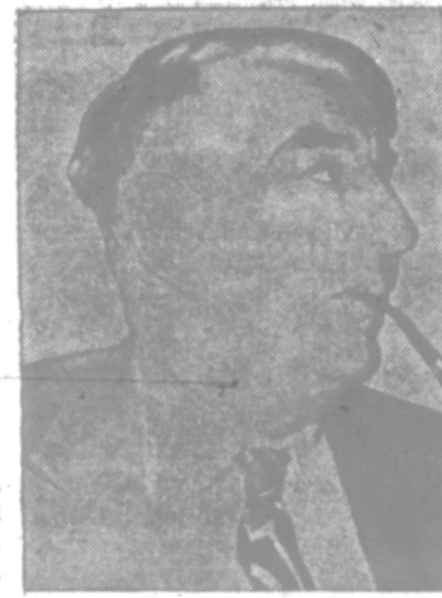
