WARNER FOR JUDGE

Oregon voters have a peculiar  
contest on the ballot this fall.  
Because Judge Harry Belt of the  
supreme court died after the  
time in which nominations  
could be made candidates will  
have to have their names writ-  
ten on the ballot.

Appointed to succeed Belt by  
Governor McKay was Harold J.  
Warner of Portland. Mr. War-  
ner began his practice of law  
in Pendleton and remained there  
for many years, serving as state  
commander of the American Leg-  
ion while a resident of that  
town.

Justice Hay is the only one  
of the seven who comes from  
eastern Oregon and the appoint-  
ment of Warner, who was from  
this part of the state and is ac-  
quainted with conditions here,  
was a help to this area.

Harold Warner is a veteran  
of two world wars, has had an  
extensive practice, is well re-  
spected by members of his pro-  
fession. He has appeared in the  
Sherman county court on several  
occasions and has been here to  
give addresses at other times.

Chief opposition to Warner  
is Allan Carson, Salem attorney,  
also a veteran of two wars. He  
has been state representative and  
is now a state senator. He has  
distinguished himself as a quib-  
bler over use of words and com-  
mas and a voter for strange  
bills.

It is our belief that the voters  
will choose wisely if they write  
in the name of Harold Warner  
for the vacant position.

THE LABOR COMMISSIONER

William E. Kimsey has been  
Oregon's labor commissioner  
since 1942. His duties are to en-  
force the labor laws, do inspec-  
tions of boilers and machinery,  
aid in safety work and to aid  
laborers in collecting wages  
when trouble arises.

Bill Kimsey is a philosophical  
gentleman of some 60 years who  
has been laborer and employer  
in Oregon for the better part of  
his life. He doesn't let his temper  
flare up but quietly gets things  
done without wasting words or  
creating trouble. His administra-  
tion has been a good one, satis-  
sfactory to both laborers and em-  
ployers.

Opposition to Kimsey this  
election comes from Howard  
Morgan, a Reed college graduate  
in economics (transportation)  
since then a navy veteran and  
owner of a farm to which he  
gives nominal attention. He was  
a member of the legislature in  
1949. He does not share Kimsey's  
ability to get along with people  
or to achieve his ends without  
high words or temper.

We think the labor department  
will get along better if Kimsey  
is retained.

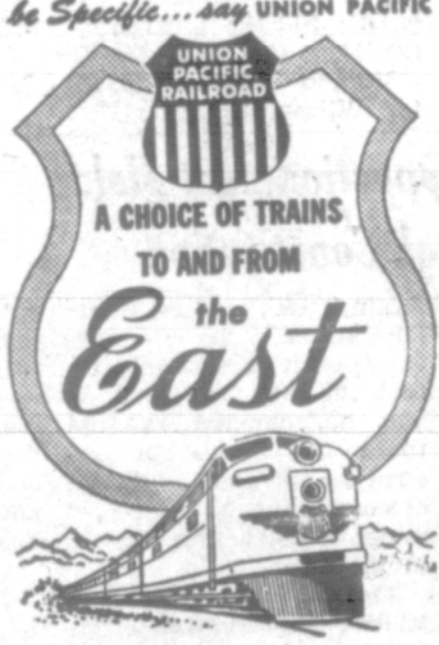

MODIFICATION OF FINDINGS  
AND DETERMINATIONS OF  
THE OREGON STATE GAME  
COMMISSION

WHEREAS, the Oregon State  
Game Commission at its stated  
meeting held July 14, 15, 28, and  
29, 1950, respectively, pursuant  
to the provisions of Section 4,  
Chapter 275, Oregon Laws 1941,  
as amended by Section 4, Chapter  
165, Oregon Laws 1945, after  
hearing, made and adopted writ-  
ten findings and determinations  
as to what, if any, wild animals  
or wild birds may be hunted,  
trapped, pursued or killed with  
gun, bow and arrow or other  
means or devices, and of what  
species, kinds and sex, and in  
what numbers, quantities or bag  
limits and in what places, man-  
ner and under what regulations,  
and at what seasons or times as  
will not affect injuriously the  
supply thereof, and

WHEREAS, the open season for  
mule deer and Columbia black-  
tail deer having not less than  
three forked antlers was fixed  
and determined as September  
30 to October 17, 1950, both dates  
inclusive, in all counties except  
Sherman County; and the open  
season for white-tail deer hav-  
ing not less than forked antlers  
was fixed and determined as Sep-  
tember 30 to October 17 1950,  
both dates inclusive, in Dou-  
glas county, and

WHEREAS, the open season for  
deer of either sex was fixed and  
determined as October 21 and  
October 22, 1950 in the following  
described areas:

Lake County:  
All of Lake County except  
those portions included in the  
following areas:

The Mule Deer Game Refuge;  
That part of Lake County  
within the Deschutes National  
Forest boundaries north and east  
of the Fremont Highway (U. S.  
31);

That part of Lake County  
south of Klamath Falls-Lakeview  
Highway (Oregon 66) and west  
of the Three Flags Highway  
(U. S. 395) south of Lakeview;

That part of Lake County  
in the following described area:  
Beginning at the junction of  
Pine Mountain road with U. S.  
Highway 20 at a point 3 miles  
east of Millican in Deschutes  
County; thence south along the  
posted road to the community  
of Lake in northern Lake Coun-  
ty; thence easterly along posted  
roads to junction with U. S.  
Highway 395 at Wagon-tire;  
thence northeasterly along U. S.  
Highway 395 to junction with  
U. S. Highway 20; thence north-  
westerly along posted county  
roads to intersection with U. S.  
Highway 20 at Brothers; thence  
westerly along U. S. Highway 20  
to Pine Mountain road, the point  
of beginning.

Klamath County:  
That portion of Klamath Coun-  
ty described as follows: Begin-  
ning at the junction of The Dalles-  
California Highway (U. S. 97)  
with the north boundary of  
Klamath County; thence south  
along The Dalles-California High-  
way to its intersection with the  
north boundary of the Klamath  
Indian Reservation; thence fol-  
lowing the boundary of the Kla-  
math Indian Reservation east  
and south to its intersection with  
the Klamath Falls-Lakeview  
Highway (Oregon 66) near Bly;  
thence east along the Klamath  
Falls-Lakeview Highway (Oregon  
66) to the intersection with the  
east boundary of Klamath Coun-  
ty; thence following the east  
boundary of Klamath County to  
intersection with Fremont High-  
way (U. S. 31), thence north-  
westerly along U. S. Highway  
31 to The Dalles-California High-  
way (U. S. 97), the point of be-  
ginning.

Deschutes County:  
That portion of Deschutes  
County east of The Dalles-Calif-  
ornia Highway (U. S. 97) out-  
side the exterior boundaries of  
national forests except that part  
included in the following des-  
cribed area: Beginning at the  
junction of Pine Mountain road

with U. S. Highway 20 at a  
point 3 miles east of Millican in  
Deschutes County; thence south  
along the posted road to the  
community of Lake in northern  
Lake County; thence easterly  
along posted roads to junction  
with U. S. Highway 395 at Wagon-  
tire; thence northeasterly along  
U. S. Highway 395 to junction  
with U. S. Highway 20; thence  
northwesterly along posted  
county roads to intersection with  
U. S. Highway 20 at Brothers;  
thence westerly along U. S.  
Highway 20 to Pine Mountain  
road, the point of beginning.

Crook, Hood River and Grant  
Counties:  
All of Crook, Hood River and  
Grant counties outside the ex-  
terior boundaries of national  
forests except that part  
included in the following des-  
cribed area: Beginning at the  
junction of Pine Mountain road  
with U. S. Highway 20 at a  
point 3 miles east of Millican  
in Deschutes County; thence  
south along the posted road to  
the community of Lake in north-  
ern Lake County; thence easterly  
along posted roads to junction  
with U. S. Highway 395 at Wa-  
gon-tire; thence northeasterly  
along U. S. Highway 395 to  
junction with U. S. Highway 20;  
thence northwesterly along pos-  
ted county roads to intersection  
with U. S. Highway 20 at Broth-  
ers; thence westerly along U.  
S. Highway 20 to Pine Mountain  
road, the point of beginning.

Baker County:  
All of Baker County outside  
the exterior boundaries of national  
forests except that portion  
east of U. S. Highway 30 and  
south of State Highway 86.

Union County:  
That portion of Union County  
east of U. S. Highway 30 and  
Oregon Highway 82 outside the  
exterior boundaries of national  
forests.

Harney County:  
All of Harney County outside  
the exterior boundaries of national  
forests except that part  
included in the following des-  
cribed area: Beginning at the  
junction of Pine Mountain road  
with U. S. Highway 20 at a  
point 3 miles east of Millican  
in Deschutes County; thence south  
along the posted road to the com-  
munity of Lake in northern  
Lake County; thence easterly  
along posted roads to junction  
with U. S. Highway 395 at Wagon-  
tire; thence northeasterly along

U. S. Highway 395 to junction  
with U. S. Highway 20; thence  
northwesterly along posted coun-  
ty roads to intersection with U.  
S. Highway 20 at Brothers;  
thence westerly along U. S.  
Highway 20 to Pine Mountain  
road, the point of beginning.

Wasco County:  
All of Wasco County south of  
Fifteen Mile Creek, north of the  
Warm Springs Indian Reserva-  
tion and west of The Dalles-  
California Highway, Oregon Hi-  
ghways 23 and 52).

Malheur County:  
That portion of Malheur Coun-  
ty north of U. S. Highway 28 and  
west of the Drogan-Miller road.

Western Oregon:  
The following described areas  
west of the summit of the Cas-  
cade Mountains: All current  
established cultivated agricul-  
tural lands and adjacent non-culti-  
vated lands within a radius of  
one mile; exclusive of Tillamook  
County and all lands within the  
exterior boundaries of national  
forests.

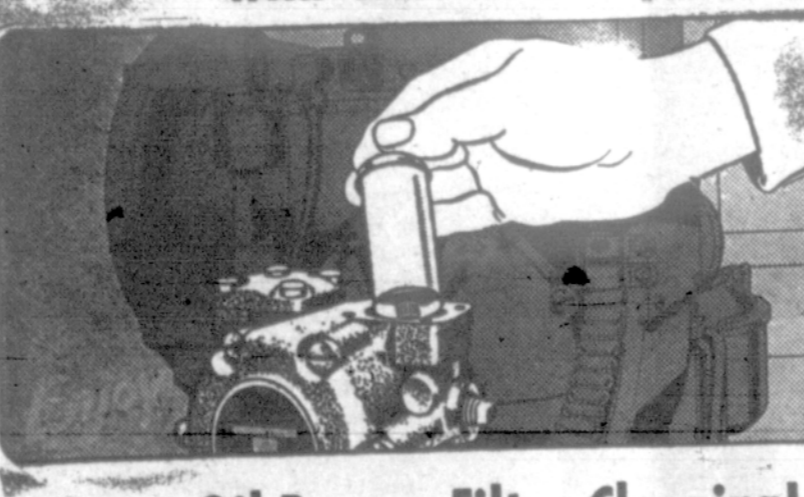
