THE MEASURES

There are nine measures on the ballot for next Tuesday for the voters to pass. Some are of tremendous importance while others are not.

The first measure is the amendment to raise the pay of legislators, who now receive \$8 per day for 50 days or about half of the session. Actual costs are over \$1000 per session without counting loss in business or between session work. The bill before the voters would raise the pay to \$1200 per biennium which approximates the cost out of each member. We recommend 300 X Yes.

The second measure is a constitutional amendment that would lend the credit of the state for the purpose of refunding the bonds used to pay for buildings and projects at the institutions of higher learning. It is claimed that the board of higher education could have \$1,200,000 by refunding at the lower interest rate direct backing by the state might bring. Opponents feel that the state has no reason to lend its credit and that the precedent would start a bad tendency. We recommend 303 X No.

Third measure is a constitutional amendment that would permit veterans who did not go to war from Oregon but who have lived here for two years to obtain the state veterans' loan. We recommend 304 X Yes.

The fourth measure on the ballot would increase the basic school fund from \$50 per census child to \$80 per census child. This bill has been discussed fully here. It would cost the county over twice what we might receive, would tend to perpetuate a poorly organized state system of district organization and would give the state more control over local schools. We recommend 307 X No.

The next two measures were passed by the legislature and then referred to the people by petition of the people. First of these is the legislative act that replaced the Dunne bill which was found inoperative by the attorney general and unsatisfactory by the federal welfare board. This bill gives the needy aged the medical care they need. It makes no claim on property owned until both recipients are dead. It is a workable bill that meets federal requirements which insist on aid being given on the basis of need. We recommend 308 X YES.

The second of referred measures is the standard time bill, which says that Oregon shall remain on standard time unless the governor finds after a hearing that the economic interests of the state would suffer, and that adjoining states have adopted other time. We feel that the state could have uniform daylight time under this bill. Advantage of the bill is that time would be established statewide instead of by towns. We recommend 310 X YES.

Three measures have been proposed by initiative petition. The first is the veterans bonus. This will undoubtedly be decided by the voters on the basis of emotional reaction and not by arguments on the economic or social effects of it. The cost would probably be between \$80,000,000 and \$90,000,000 or almost \$5,000,000 per year for 20 years. It is a federal bonus and it was the federal government that sent the boys to war. Total possible is \$600, which in time of high inflation, is slight pay for services given. No recommendation.

A constitutional amendment to establish a method for apportionment of the legislature is the eighth measure on the ballot. It

is easily the most important of any. It recognizes the necessity for more than one method of choosing members of the legislature, which is the principle found in the constitution of the United States. It will give to rural Oregon the legislative strength needed to insure the continued growth of the state. It restricts any county to a quarter of the members of the legislature. There are many conclusive reasons why the entire state will be aided by a vote of 314 X YES.

The final measure on the ballot is one that would prevent the sale of liquor in Oregon that is advertised in the state. That would probably mean that instead of buying known brands of liquor from state stores at a state profit of some \$12,000,000 per year the people would buy moonshine in the alleys with additional costs for enforcement. This bill would not be effective for the purpose intended which is prohibition. We recommend 317 X NO.
