## TRAFFIC DEATHS, GROW

Oregon traffic accidents claimed 41 lives in October to mark the fourth consecutive month in which traffic deaths have reached or exceeded 40, the secretary of state department reports.

October fatalities bring the toll for the year thus far to 333, up 17 percent from the 275 lives lost at the same time last year. Thirty-nine persons were killed in October of 1949.

The traffic death upsurge was first apparent in July when 54 fatalities were recorded. Accident records list 52 more deaths in August and 40 in September, now augmented by October's toll of 41.

"If this trend continues during the remainder of the year, it will wipe out all of the traffic-death reduction earned in 1949 and set Oregon back to its 1948 level," the department states. The early darkness and frequent storm conditions of the late fall and winter consistently make driving more dangerous mile for mile than at any other time of the year. It's the wrong season for continuing to drive at summer speeds.

## PMA EXTENDS TIME

The local PMA committee has extended the final date for completing and reporting the weed control practices for which payment is made under the Agricultural Conservation program. The new date is December 1st. The subsiding practice date has also been extended to December 1st. According to Thomas W. Thompson, secretary, this extension should allow all operators to complete the work and report same to the county office. This year the committee has increased the payment for perennial weed control to 100 percent of the cost of the chemicals used. This increase was made to enable operators to cooperate with the County Court's Weed Control law.

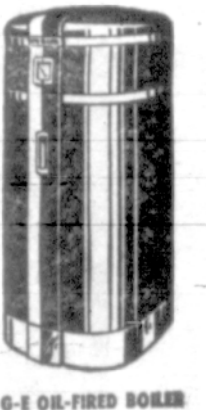
