Everyone told what they wanted most for Christmas, then in a game everyone wished each other a Merry Christmas.

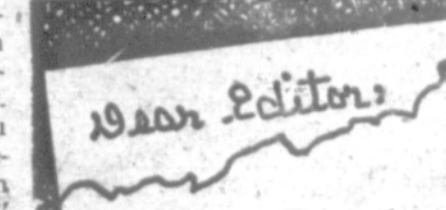

Mrs. James Tate's father, Mr. Rice of St. Helens, spent the week end with them.

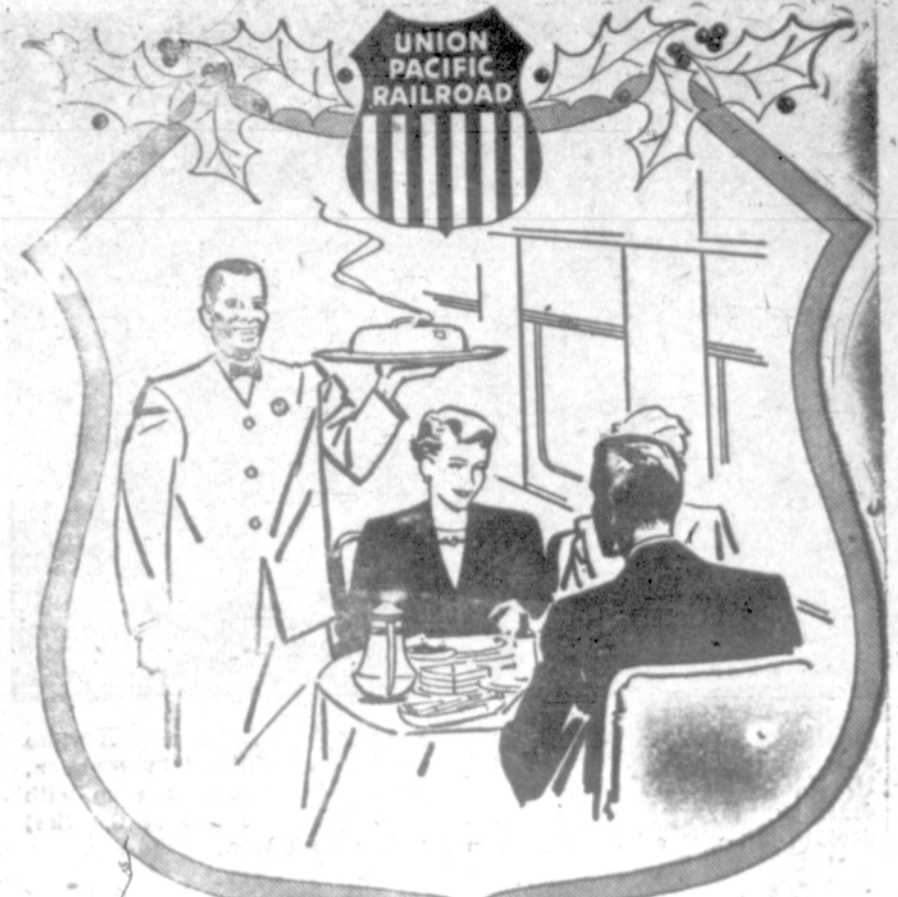
