DEPOSITS AND LOANS UP AT U. S. BANK

The United States National bank, in its year-end report showed a gain in deposits of \$47,775,350 since the corresponding report a year ago.

The current loans and discounts total of \$180,338,908 represents a gain of \$32,120,100 since a year ago. This increase is an indication of the business and industrial expansion achieved in the state during 1950.

The Dalles branch shows loans and discounts total of \$5,672,395, Reynolds stated. Growing in all phases of its banking activity, the United States National bank reports total resources of more than \$614,957,960. This is a gain of \$50,932,537 in the past 12 months.
