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HOW BANKS SERVE, EDUCATIONAL FILM, BEING SHOWN BY JOHN SELL IN SCHOOLS

A new film, "How Banks Serve," which shows the basic functions of commercial banking, as safeguarding, transferring funds, and making loans, is being shown to all high schools in Wasco and Sherman counties by The Dalles branch, First National Bank of Portland.

"How Banks Serve" is not an advertising film, but instead a visual education aid developed by banks as a part of their general public relations program. It shows the usefulness of checking accounts in the making of payments and in collecting funds. It explains how banks help people save money. It shows how banks loan money for business needs, home financing, home repairs, and remodeling, personal purposes, and for other needs which arise in each family.

This film will prove valuable in classroom teaching when used in connection with textbooks and lecture presentations in economics and other courses. The film obtained by The Dalles Branch, First National Bank of Portland, is a production of the American Bankers Association, which has undertaken production of a series of films on banking and business subjects for use in high schools.

The film is being presented by John I. Sell, assistant vice president First National Bank of Portland, at the high schools in Wasco, Moro, Wasco, Rufus, Maupin, Mosier, The Dalles high school and St. Mary's academy.

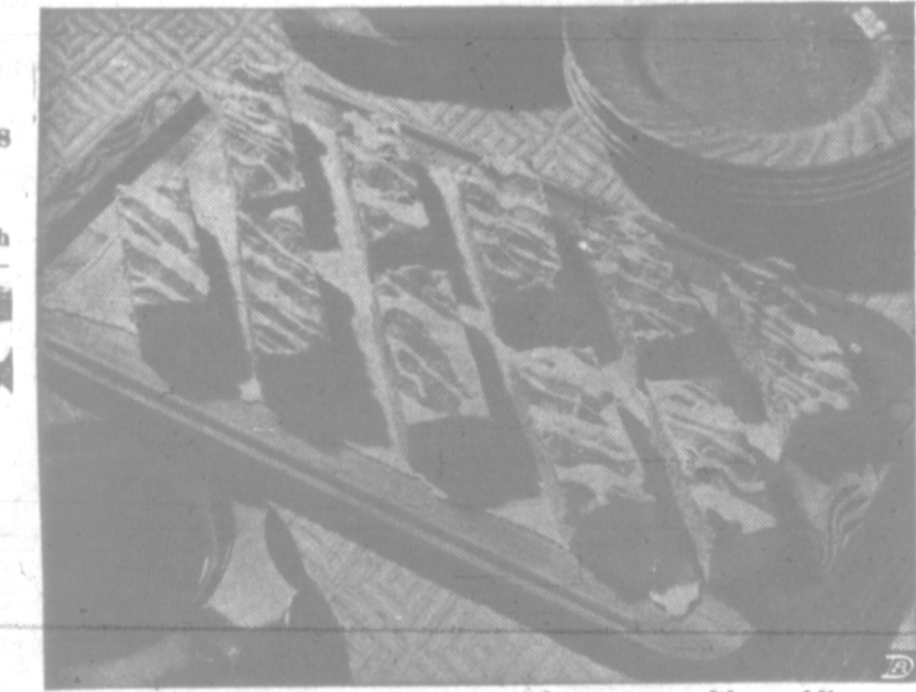
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Molasses Orange Bars

- MOLASSES ORANGE BARS**
(Quick-Mix Method)
- 1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour
 - 1/2 cup molasses
 - 1/2 cup orange sugar
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1/2 cup vanilla extract
 - 1/2 cup Orange Sugar
 - 1/2 cup shortening
 - 1 egg
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1/2 cup vanilla extract
 - 1/2 cup Orange Sugar
- Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt, and sugar. Sprinkle orange rind over flour mixture. Add shortening, molasses, eggs, milk and vanilla extract. Stir to combine ingredients.
- Orange Sugar
- Mix together
Makes 24 bars, 1x3 1/4 inches.

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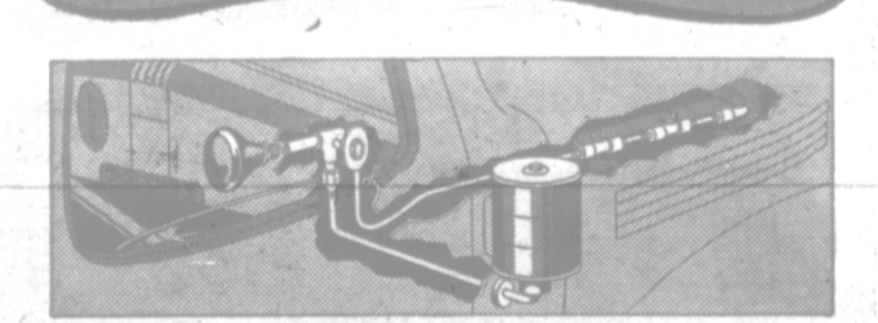
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
