The temperature hovered just above zero Monday and Tuesday morning, however the wind dropped Monday morning and altho the temperature was cold it did not go through one nor the houses which heated easily with the drop of the wind.

This freezing will really do damage to the fields and country as there's no cover crop to protect the wheat. When it thaws every bit of the moisture will run away from the bare ground, perhaps leaving erosion in many fields.
