NOTICE OF FILING APPLICATION FOR A CHANGE IN POINT OF DIVERSION OF WATER

Notice is hereby given that E. E. Shull has filed an application in the office of Chas. E. Stricklin, State Engineer for the approval of a change in point of diversion of water from Grass Valley Canyon.

Certificate of water right issued to J. P. Yates and recorded at page 9092, Volume 8, State Record of Water Right Certificates, confirms a right under Permit No. 9969, for the use of water from Grass Valley Canyon for the irrigation of 4 acres in the NW 1/4 NW 1/4, Sec. 32, T. 1 N., R. 18 E., W. 31, with a date of priority of Dec. 31, 1930.

Certificate of water right issued to Harold R. Shull and Fred Houghton, recorded at page 8872, Volume 8, State Record of Water Right Certificates, confirms a right under Permit No. 7155 for the use of water from Grass Valley Canyon, for the irrigation of 9 acres in the NE 1/4 NW 1/4, Sec. 32, T. 1 N., R. 18 E., W. 31, with a date of priority of Jan. 3, 1928.

The foregoing described lands are irrigated by means of a gravity ditch, the point of diversion of said ditch being located North 65 degrees 24 minutes West 3197 feet from the SE corner of Section 30, T. 1 N., R. 18 E., W. 31.

E. E. Shull, owner of the lands above described, to which said water rights are appurtenant, proposes to irrigate said lands by means of a portable pumping plant to be located along his lands along Grass Valley Canyon, some times called Grass Valley Creek, within the NW 1/4 NW 1/4, Sec. 32, T. 1 N., R. 18 E., W. 31.

DEMAND FOR WHEAT STRONG AT PORTLAND

Since the middle of January grain prices in Oregon have been strong to higher. The demand for wheat at Portland has been strong. Local millers have been buying heavily of milling quality grain. However, this in some cases has been difficult to do during the recent weeks because of rail embargoes. Receipts of wheat at Pacific Northwest terminals last week dropped to 416 cars. This is less than half of the previous average weekly receipts for some time.

The demand for export wheats has been very strong at Portland and other northwest ports. Four cargoes are being shipped to India, with one to the United Kingdom.

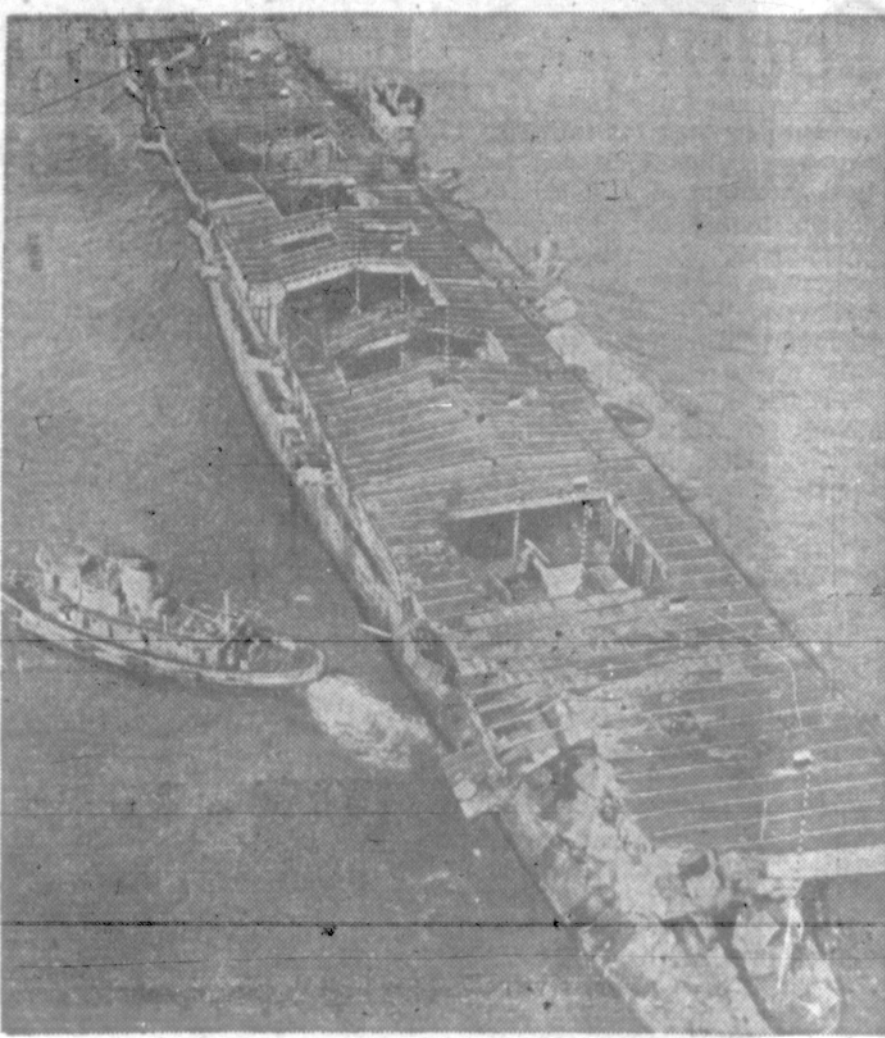
ATOMIC RADIATION TOPIC OF OSC BIOLOGY MEETING

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—The effect of atomic radiation on living organisms will be the central theme around which the annual Biology Colloquium at Oregon State college will be built this year. The one-day meeting, which is open to the general public, is scheduled for April 21.

Dr. Curt Stern, of the University of California department of zoology, will be this year's leader. He is a member of the civilian and atomic energy commission and was the first president of the Human Genetics society.
