Later small heart shaped cakes were served from a lace covered table, the centerpiece of red carnations with angel hair at the base and a candelabra of red tapers at either side.

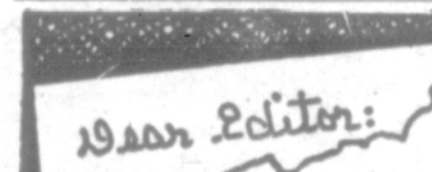
4-H BEEF CLUB HAS DEHORNING LESSON

The service was read at 7:00 o'clock that evening by the Reverend H. Gravenor in the presence of relatives and friends, many coming from out-of-town for the occasion.

Incidental music was played just before and at the close of the ceremony, with Mrs. H. Gravenor at the piano, who also rendered the bridal processionals.

The candles were lighted by Miss Anne Palmer, cousin of the bride, who wore a sheer floor length frock of white over pink, and carrying a white taper.

RED CROSS FIELD DIRECTORS SOLVE SERVICEMEN'S PROBLEMS



Red Cross services to the armed forces are available wherever U. S. servicemen are stationed. Here a Red Cross field director goes right to a young sailor at work on his ship for the facts he needs to help solve a problem.

The sailor was young. He had finished his home leave in a southern coastal city and was heading back to his California base.

He said goodbye to his parents and to an older brother, a marine veteran just returned from service. Then he left by bus.

A few hours later the older brother was killed in an automobile accident. The family appealed to the Red Cross to locate the younger son so he could return home.

Within a short while a Red Cross chapter secretary along the route intercepted the bus, broke the news, and helped the lad get started back home. There the chapter got in touch with the field director at the west coast base and verified the facts for the commanding officer who was being asked to extend the sailor's leave.

Once or more every minute, around the clock last year, the Red Cross performed some service for members of the military forces and their families. Among the nearly three quarters of a million cases handled, a large percentage involved supplying verified information concerning home conditions requiring emergency leave or extension of leave. While the Red Cross cannot grant leave to a serviceman, military authorities depend upon

its post field directors and the network of chapters for reports of conditions underlying such leave requests.

Field directors in 364 military installations and hospitals and 1,059 itinerant- and sub-stations in this country and abroad aid servicemen with personal problems that range from babies and budgets to helping straighten out delays that hold up pay or family allowances.

The serviceman has his family problems, marital difficulties, financial strains, and family illnesses—all disturbing to morale.

Field directors, providing 24-hour service at military installations, are pretty much in the same situation as the family doctor. They are routed out of bed at all hours to face any one of a hundred complicated problems. Sometimes it may be to get a report on the condition of a critically ill member of a soldier's family, or to lend him money for an emergency trip home, or to find housing for a family unexpectedly arriving at the post.

Whatever the problem, the serviceman feels free to turn to the Red Cross for help, knowing that he will find a sympathetic friend in the man wearing the Red Cross uniform.

E. E. DILLINGER BURIED IN ROSE CEMETERY

The funeral of Elmer E. Dillinger, who died in Portland Wednesday night in a gas-filled apartment, was held in The Dalles Saturday at 12:30 p. m., with interment following in the Rose cemetery east of Moro.

Dillinger lived for many years in Sherman county and is sur-

vived by his mother, Mrs. Estella Dillinger, of The Dalles and two sisters, Mrs. Edith M. Andrews and Mrs. C. H. Alford, both of Portland.

FARMERS SHOULD PLACE SQUIRREL BAIT ORDERS

Farmers were reminded today by T. W. Thompson, county agent that ground squirrel bait can be obtained by notifying Jas. Jones, Grass Valley, or contacting the county extension agent's office in Moro.

The bait material consisting of strychnine is ready mixed and prepared by the Fish and Wildlife Service. The strychnine bait is universally used and found to be more reliable and cheaper for the results obtained than any other poison, states Thompson. The poison is mixed on barley or oats depending on the kind of squirrels encountered.

The best period for squirrel baiting is some months away, but farmers should place orders now to obtain the poison bait material. Baiting time is most successful when squirrels have been out for some time. Yarrow is a good index for baiting squirrels in that their blossoms are well advanced and ready to drop squirrels begin to turn to grain for food. May 1 to July 1 is the generally recommended baiting time, states Thompson.

James Jones, government trapper, Fish and Wildlife Service, will give farmers assistance in applying the bait material. Bait is broadcast along entrances of burrows or along trails made by squirrels. Liberal amounts of bait are required to obtain good kills.

WEED SPRAY BULLETIN OUT TO HELP FARMERS

A new bulletin designed to aid Sherman county farmers in selecting, caring for, operating and managing their weed spraying equipment has been published by the Oregon State college agricultural experiment station, reports T. W. Thompson, county agent.

Entitled "Weed Spraying Equipment," station bulletin No. 493 was written by C. E. Page, assistant agricultural engineer at OSC.

The equipment guide includes detailed information on types of pumps, spray booms, tanks, nozzles and management of spray rigs. A handy chart lists the sprayer requirements of common weed killers. The bulletin is well illustrated with drawings and close-up photographs of modern spray equipment.

Copies of this bulletin are available through the county extension office in Moro, states Thompson. Also available is the Extension Bulletin No. 687 "2,4-D as a Weed Killer," prepared by Virgil Freed and Rex Warren, Weed Experts of Oregon State College.
