TWO FOREIGN STUDENTS COMPARE SCHOOL SYSTEMS
The South Sherman P.T.A. met at the Grass Valley school Tuesday night with about 70 persons present. The program consisted of interesting talks given by two foreign exchange students telling of the educational systems of their countries. These young ladies are students at OSC and were introduced by Howard Akers, field representative for the general extension service in Central Oregon.

Miss Valli Griener is from Munich, Germany, and has been a teacher in home economics and agriculture there. She explained in detail the educational system in Western Germany which has been in effect for 200 years.

Miss Chiyono Matsushima who was a high school teacher in Japan, told in an interesting manner of the new system of education in her country which was adopted in 1946 and follows the one used in the United States.

She spoke especially of the advantages and also the disadvantages of such an extreme change in their way of living.

CONTRACT LET FOR BPA MAUPIN-DETROIT LINE

Bids were opened last week by the Bonneville Power Administration, for construction of the Maupin-Detroit Dam section of the administration's Grand Coulee-Detroit 230 kv transmission line, according to H. R. Richmond Jr., manager of the Mid-Columbia district office of BPA.

This 74-mile line is needed as a link in the administration's system for transmitting Grand Coulee power to meet the increasing power requirements of south-

western Oregon. This line is scheduled for energization on December 1, 1951.
