Sherman county was passed in the house last week. It is an amended county high school law which was rewritten to remove the errors made in 1949 wherein the district having a high school could vote in a county high school election. It Sherman county wants one high school the means will probably be available soon.

The bill from the Holy report is being fought by the grange which feels that there would be too few school board members in rural granges. Other farm groups are not so active against it. For it is the P-TA and the well trained school lobby which has nearly always been successful in getting what it wants from an Oregon legislature.

**TROUBLE AT THE TOP**

The firing of General MacArthur has certainly put the president back on the front pages and brought about a serious disagreement among the American people which has, so far, only been explained by the assumption of arrogance.

There seems to be little doubt that MacArthur did assume some civilian duties, did run the oriental show much as he wished to do it and from a military point of view that is inexcusable and sufficient reason for removal.

However, MacArthur had been given administrative power over the Japanese who idolized him from all accounts. Undoubtedly he has done a successful job at smoothing their war ruffled feelings and making them reasonably well acquainted with the processes of democracy. Also he has been responsible for the lives of some 200 thousand American soldiers and some from other countries.

Does anyone suppose that MacArthur, who has spent a large part of his life in the Orient, who has been a successful leader of men, who is an administrator beyond compare, would easily accept the advice and orders from a bunch of nit-wits now governing this nation? There was too much responsibility on his shoulders to not permit him to exercise his own judgment.

There is no American foreign policy about Korea; had there been there would have been no Korean "incident." Washington does not know what to do nor who is to do it. MacArthur has been where he had to know and do.

Sure, Truman had a perfect right to fire MacArthur and for those steeped in the traditionalism of the army it may be considered proper.

But we are not trying to maintain anything so stupid as that traditionalism. We are trying to make citizens out of the Japanese, to combat and discourage Russia in Korea, to defeat the Red Chinese by indirect means if possible, by conflict if necessary and to retain our national standing in the east.

We cannot do any of those things under the rulings of an administration that cannot respect at home.

**Members Offered Scholarship Try For Coming Year**

Now that the Safeway scholarship awards have been made for the 1951 4-H Summer School at Oregon State College, it's time to start working for a scholarship next year, says County Agent Thomas W. Thompson. The public relations manager of the Safeway Stores, E. H. Johnson, has announced that a \$20 scholarship will again be offered in 1952 to the 4-H'er with the best livestock breeding project in Sherman county.

Any club member with such a project as dairy, beef, hogs, sheep or goats is eligible. October 25, 1951, is the deadline when record books must be turned in to the county extension office to be judged. The top contestants will also be interviewed by a county committee.

The county winner may then compete the following year for the state award of a \$100 college scholarship.

If a club member has already won a summer school scholarship he is not eligible for another.
