So this is HOUSEKEEPING — I'm confused.

On one hand, I read in the news columns that the nation's defense manpower shortage can only be solved by attracting women back to the production lines.

And then, often in the same issue, I read of the imposition of new restrictions on the uses of metals which go into the production of such household appliances as washing machines.

It's here that I get thoroughly confused.

It seems contradictory to say "women, come join the defense production effort," and then, in the next breath, take away from the homemakers one of the very tools which would make it possible for her to put in those

hours on the assembly line. A homemaker's first responsibility is to her family. Not only must she feed it, but she must see that its clothing and housing is clean. For most of us that means using the washing machine, an appliance which long ago left the luxury class and became one of the home's absolute necessities.

Severely limit the output of washing machines and what happens? For one, many thousands of washers which annually become obsolete could not be replaced, for lack of new machines, or could not be repaired, for lack of replacement parts.

I believe you'll agree the result then would be that many of us would have to revert to washing clothing by hand. A time as well as an energy consumer, this job would right away put a big damper on any woman's ideas of putting in some time on a factory assembly line.

If the government wants female help to return to the job of making guns, ammunition and aircraft engines, it had better wake up and see to it that these women have a ready supply of the appliances needed to reduce to a minimum the time and energy spent in keeping her house.

Either that or devise some way to stretch the woman's day from 24-hours to 48 hours!

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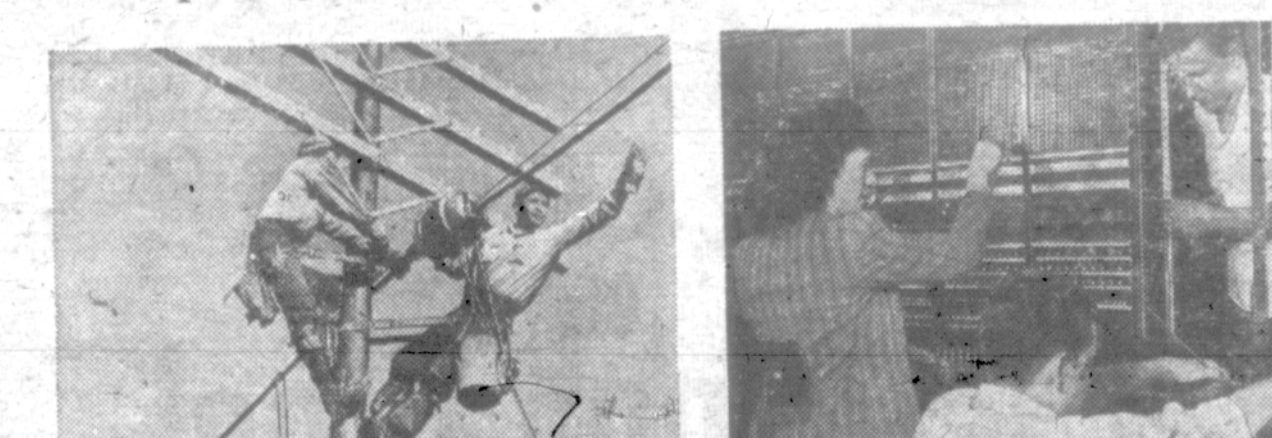
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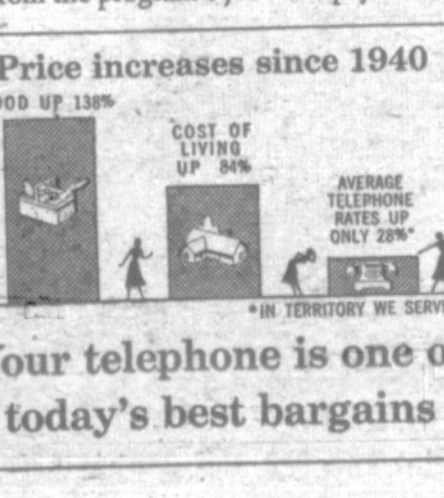
