On arriving, each guests name was entered in the club record book and everyone was presented with handmade sweetpea corsages in pastel shades prepared by Mrs. Vivian Rust and Mrs. L. E. Kaseberg. Mrs. H. Gravenor favored with organ numbers during the registration of guests and preceding the program.

The afternoon was opened under the direction of Mrs. Walter Bruckert, club president, who led the assembly in the pledge of allegiance to the flag and the singing of the National Anthem. Mrs. Bruckert, extended a cordial welcome to all present and briefly reviewed the origin of Mother's Day.
