Chicken raisers may improve on their methods or learn the art of caponizing of cockerels, Tuesday afternoon, May 29, during a caponizing demonstration, reports T. W. Thompson, county agent.

Caponizing may be performed by the average person, man or woman, with proper equipment. The operation may be performed on heavy cockerels such as New Hampshire or Rhode Island Reds from eight to ten weeks of

age or White Leghorns from six to seven weeks of age.

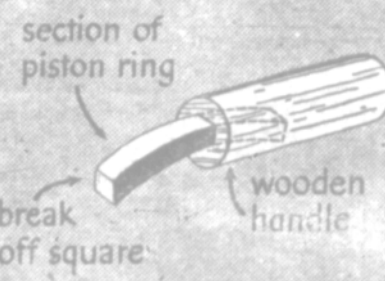
Noel Bennion, extension poultry specialist of OSC, will carry on the demonstration. Included discussion and demonstration of culling laying hens to weed out the low and non-producing birds.

All county people who are interested are welcome to attend, the county agent says. The demonstration is being held at the request of farm people in the Grass Valley area. Those who have desire for more information on this subject should circle May 29 on their calendar.

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
