BARLEY SUPPORT PRICE SET AT \$1.24 bu.

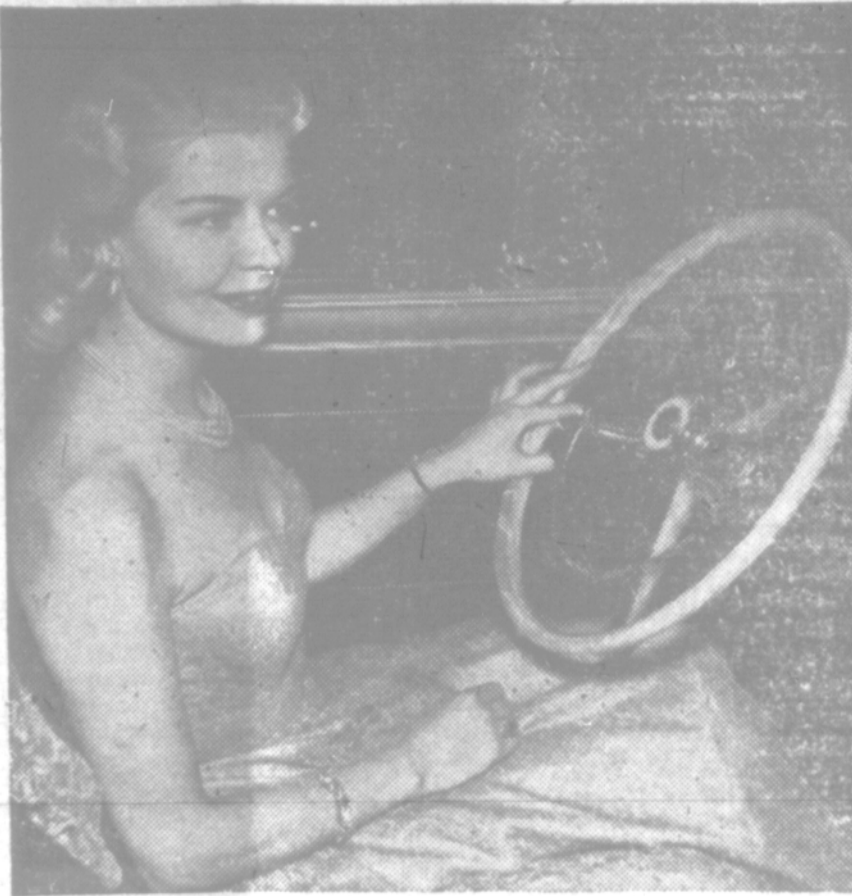
Price support program for the 1951 wheat and barley crop has been announced, says Ralph Busse, assistant secretary of the county PMA committee. Wheat price support at a national average of \$2.18 per bushel for the 1951 crop compares to last year's average of \$1.99 per bushel, Busse reports. Terminal market price rates at Portland are \$2.40. Sherman county rates have not been announced to date. Busse indicates freight rate reduction was \$0.16 per bushel last year from Portland but some reports indicated this will be increased to \$0.17.

The price support for the 1951 crop in accordance with applicable legislative provisions is 90 percent of parity at the beginning of the marketing year, July 1. July parity is \$2.42 a bushel. For the same date last year the wheat price parity was \$2.21 a bushel.

Probably loan figures will be \$2.23 or \$2.24 per bushel. Due to change in warehouse charges, however, reduction of 10 cents per bushel will be made on the loan rate to cover expense bringing the cash value to \$2.13 or \$2.14. Farm storage loans will obtain this 10 cent per bushel at time of loan application.

The 1951 price support rate for barley in Sherman county is \$1.24 per bushel. The terminal market rate at Portland has been set at \$1.37 per bushel.

PRINTING WAGES HIGHEST

New highs for hourly and weekly earnings of Oregon's printing and publishing plants with weekly earnings advanced \$1.73 over April mainly because of longer hours.

Mr. and Mrs. George Wilson of Kent and two sons flew to Halsey Monday to attend the funeral of Mrs. Tom Preece, who with her husband was formerly a teacher in Kent and Moro schools.

The weekly average reached \$77.40, while the hourly figure went to \$1.95, both slightly above the previous record set in April. Striking gains by logging and sawmill workers, who earned \$83.19 a week and \$2.10 an hour, were mainly responsible. For the first time this year, their earnings were greater than for those in plywood and other wood products plants and for those in machinery manufacturing.

Highest hourly and weekly rates, however, came from printing and publishing plants with \$2.34 and \$84.41 respectively. Weekly earnings advanced \$1.73 over April mainly because of longer hours.

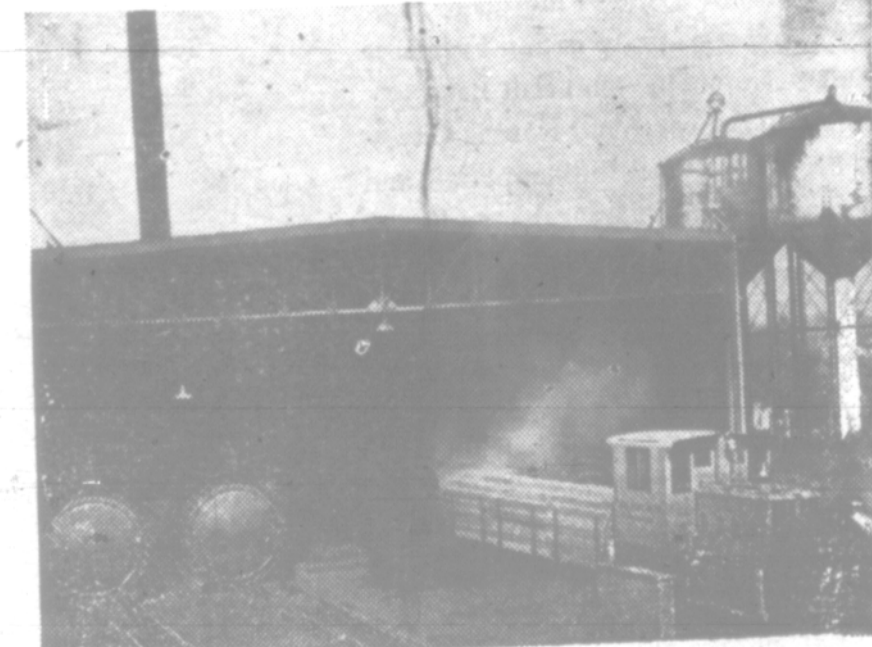
