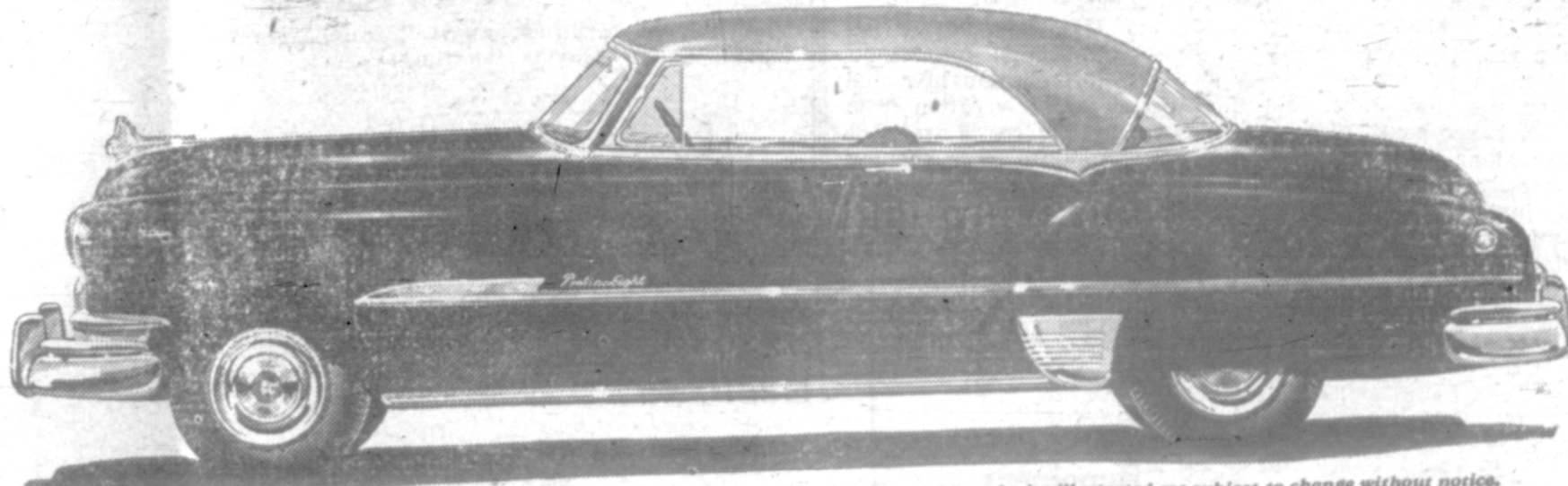
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It is said to be a lawyer's trick to ask "What were you doing the night of April 10, 1932?" We're not for the present interested in history of that nature.

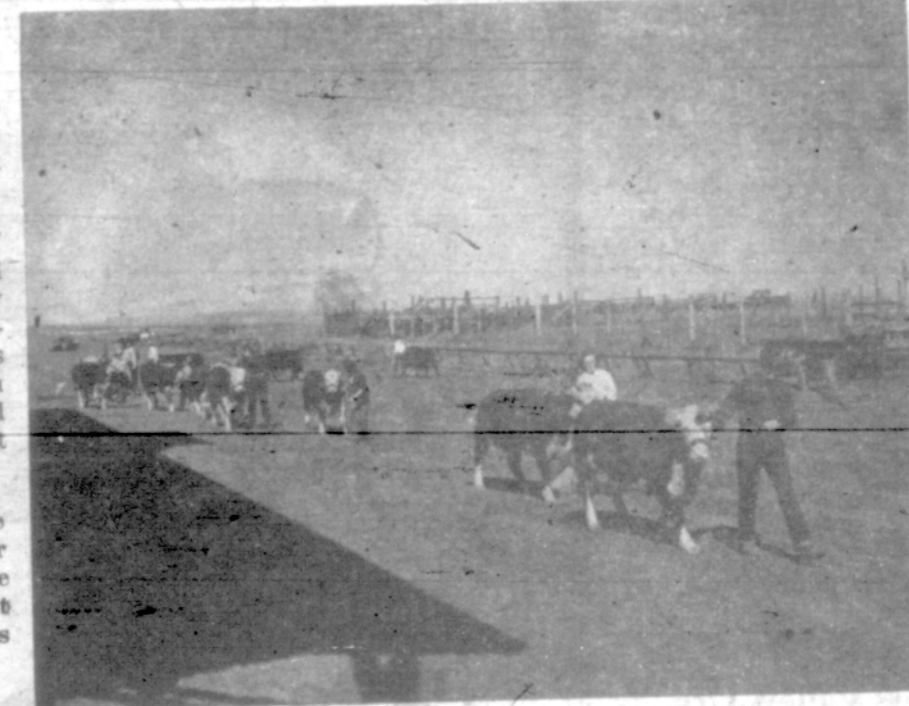
But we do want to venture into the future a little and tell what you'll be doing September 15, 1951. You'll be at the Sherman County Fair. Why sure.

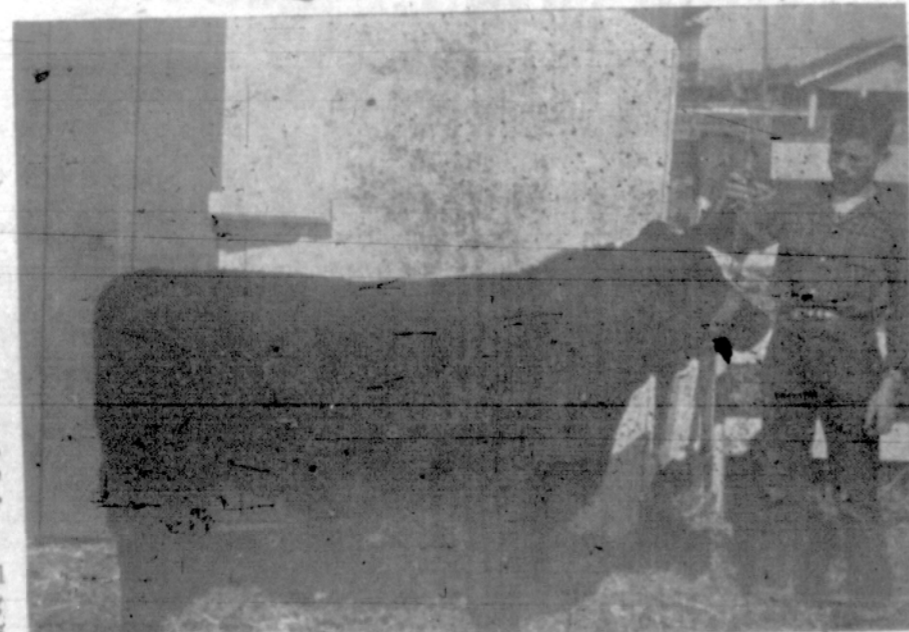
