Russ Longnecker was here briefly this week to see about some flying.

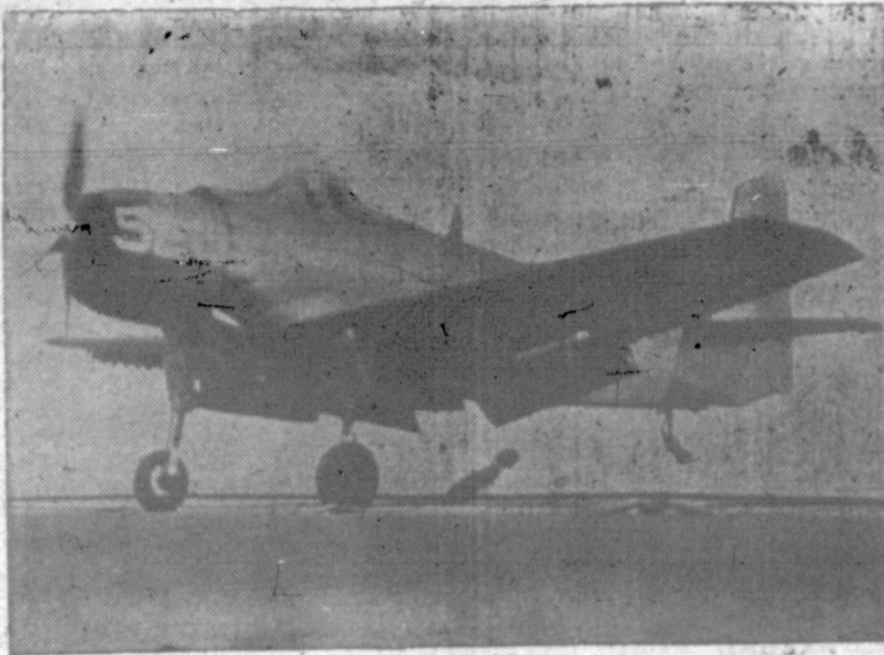

BANK HAS NEW PLAN

Under the provisions of new legislation which allows establishment of a common trust fund in Oregon for the first time, the First National Bank of Portland will begin operation of its diversified common trust fund on August 2, according to Carrel S. Bennett, manager of the bank's Sherman County branch.

Following the lead of 34 other states which now offer the common trust fund as an investment medium for trusts and estates, the Oregon legislature passed the permissive bill at its last session. According to F. N. Belgrano, Jr., president of First National, this legislation has made the advantages of greater income and increased safety of investment available to thousands of Oregon families who now have or will have an interest in a trust or estate.

Under First National's diversified common trust fund plan, trusts or estates with as little as a few thousand dollars can realize a return greater than before without sacrifice of protection of investment, Belgrano said. This is possible through the participation of individual trusts and estates in a fund for investment purposes.
