### POOR DRIVERS LOSE RIGHT

Seventy-seven Oregon drivers had licenses suspended during July for violating traffic laws, the secretary of state's office said today. The suspensions came after court convictions on traffic counts or discretionary action by the state, and brought to 598 the number of suspensions since January.

July suspensions hit hard at reckless drivers, with 32 handed out. Eighteen others lost licenses because of bad records, which for violation of the basic speed rule; and three more will travel on foot for violating the state's traffic code, the basic rule.

Six drivers had licenses lifted means their names were appearing too frequently on accident reports or they were considered "regulars" in traffic courts.

Traffic violations, some 3,600 of which were recorded during the month, also continued to mount in the state, the safety division of the secretary's office said. All traffic convictions are recorded on individual driver's license files.

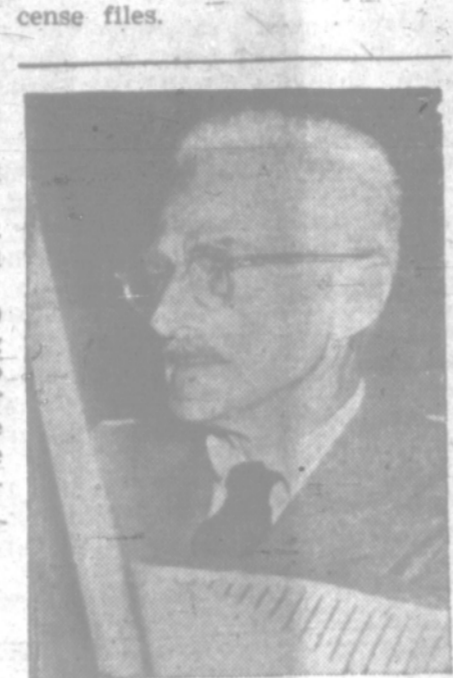
