### FAIR BETTING HIGH

Presaging an even greater support of the many county fairs throughout the state, the 1951 Oregon State Fair reports a new all-time pari-mutuel handle of \$564,040, according to final figures released by Leo G. Spitzhart, manager of the exposition.

He pointed out that 12 and one-half percent of the total pari-mutuel handle is withheld. Out of this total, 9 and one-half percent is kept by the fair itself and is utilized to defray such costs as; purses for the meeting (some \$30,000); salaries of racing officials representing both the fair and the racing commission; maintenance and installation costs of mutuel machines; maintenance of the track; clerical expenses and various other items of expense.

Three per cent of the total

handle is retained in a fund administered by the racing commission from which monies are allotted to various county fairs, the Pacific International and the State Fair itself. In allocations from last year's handle, the State Fair received \$35,000 as did the Pacific International.

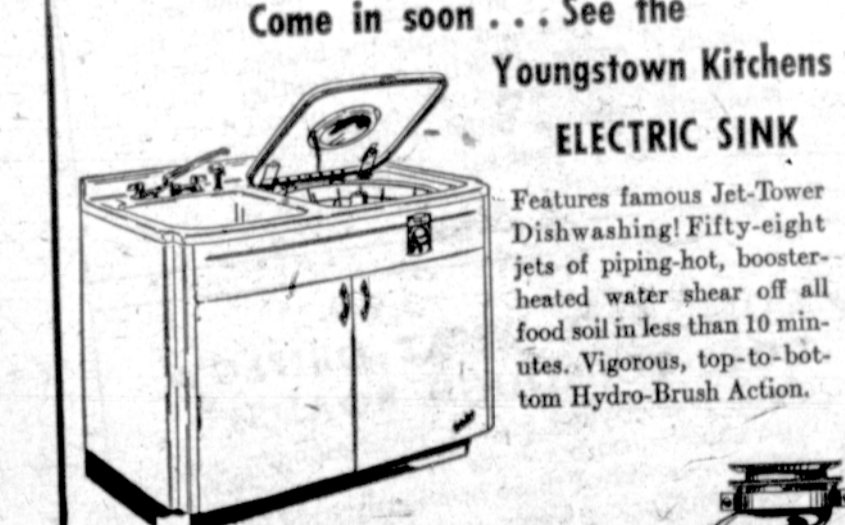
