Fred Dormaler's Palomino stallion was best in his class and W. C. Helyer had the best young stallion. Sadie Rich had the best stallion under one year and Gordon Helyer the second. W. C. Helyer's aged mare was best among Palominos with Robert Helyer second and Sharon Martin third. For mares 2 and under 3 years W. C. Helyer placed first with W. J. Coons and Thompsons following. For younger mares Beverly Helyer was first and Judith Helyer second and Sadie Rich third. The mare colt class found Elvin Helyer winning from his father, Durward Helyer. W. C. Helyer had the best get of sires among the Palominos and also the first place produce of mare.

A Pinto-class was allowed to show with the Durward Helyer children competing and "Bucky" getting first place. In the Shetland pony class Kenneth Sather had the best stallion and the best mares but William Jeffries, Rosalie Eslinger and Nancy McKean bested him for mares under

a year old.

There were large classes of saddle horses and they were divided between mares and geldings. Leonard Fields had the best mare followed by Marjorie Van Gilder and Vince Genteman. For geldings Wilbur Leon Helyer had first, Vince Genteman second and Marjorie VanGilder third.

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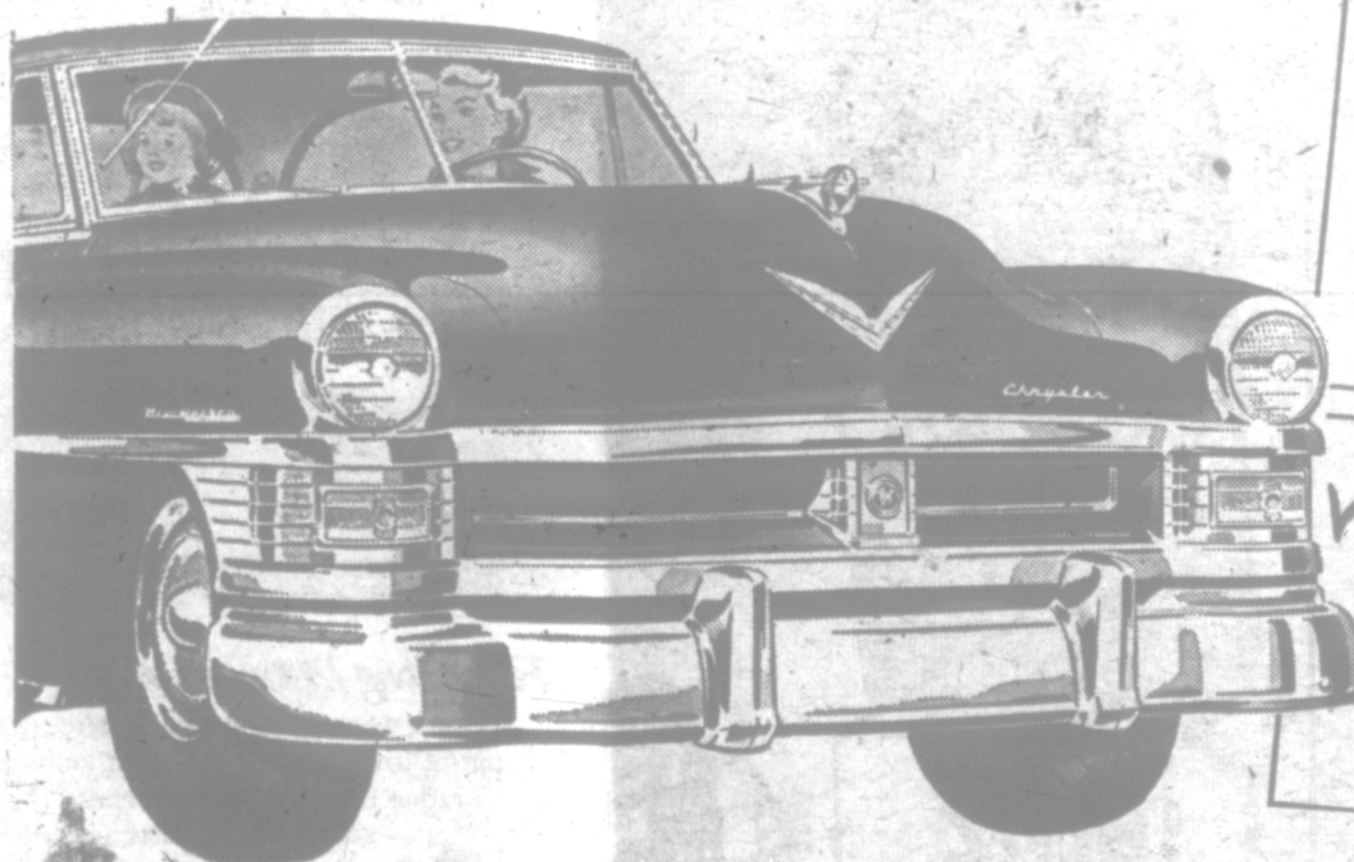


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
