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EISENHOWER

The ways of Americans are often very amusing. We are such hero worshippers. We hate and love so freely and sometimes without having reasons for same. We have worried for months over General Eisenhower, whether he would run for president, whether he was Republican or Democrat. And probably the good man could be elected if he tried just because his name has been long and favorably before the public and because he has a short and attractive nickname.

What General Eisenhower thinks about civilian matters is not known and perhaps is as dark a secret to him as to anyone inasmuch as he hasn't had to think about civilian matters during his life. On foreign affairs he would probably be inclined to follow the same course the nation was on when he became prominent in Europe.

He might make us a fine president although our experience with military men in that office has not been too good. It is discouraging that those who most want him to run are little concerned about what he thinks and greatly concerned with his popularity. They want him so they can beat someone else, not because he has policies in which they believe. That is true of both parties and if Eisenhower could put aside his natural ambitions toward the presidency he would not let his prestige be used by politicians for their own selfish purposes.

From what we hear in conversations the American people are not happy over this nation's foreign policy. It has been indecisive, has brought us no friends, has engaged us in interminable wars and prevented us from winning the present one; has brought death and wounds to thousands of young men without gain to the nation. At the same time it is too expensive and is still based on the premise that we can preach to other nations successfully and buy them with our cash. It is certainly not based on much knowledge of history or understanding of human nature.

In domestic affairs Eisenhower is unknown and while he would probably be an improvement over the dollar wasting group we have recently known his views should be known before he is acclaimed as perfect.

ENGLISH ELECTION

In less than a month the English are going to hold an election and it is expected that the socialists will be defeated and Churchill will again become prime minister.

Socialism is the theory that government can manage industry better than individuals; that the distribution of goods can be made more equitable if the government does it than if it is left to the usual economic laws. It has never worked in England or any other place.

Government is less efficient than private business. It lacks the urge and drive for profit which helps keep private business efficient. (This entails keeping private business competitive.) In government men who become prominent for some reason try to influence other things about which they are uninformed. Purpose of politicians who manage government is to stay in power, not to govern efficiently.

Citizens take advantage of governments and oft times governments invite them to at election times. In order to retain support the English socialists offered the people many medical and social services, so many they could not be provided. Englishmen were provided with new teeth, glasses, crutches, pensions, retirements and sick pay. But there has never been enough food or houses. Money dribbled out to the people for teeth could not be used to bolster the national exchange.

It is reported that the English, or a majority of them, have grown up, that they realize that they must depend on themselves instead of the government. They cannot longer put their feet under John Bull's table. We will await the election be-

cause it and the 1952 election in this country, may foretell the future of government by the people. If the people by their votes take more from the national economy than they put in, democracy will be deemed a failure.

CORRECT-TIME AGAIN

Those who desire may arise early next Sunday morning, about 2 a. m. we understand, and set their clocks back to standard time. Despite the flurry of argument about continuation of fast time Sunday will see the end of it in Oregon for this year.

Arguments at this time about daylight saving time is out of place. Consideration of the plea of power authorities that saving time be continued because of shortage of electricity is pertinent. These men claim that more electricity is used on standard time. In cities they may be correct because lights would be turned on at dark and factory shifts might not be ended. When darker days come and darker mornings the difference would be less noticeable.

It is possible that some means of curtailing the use of electricity will be necessary until we get enough dams in the Pacific northwest. To a mere observer there seems a lot of waste, instead of talking about sending the aluminum plants away it might be more sensible to find ways of conserving electricity.

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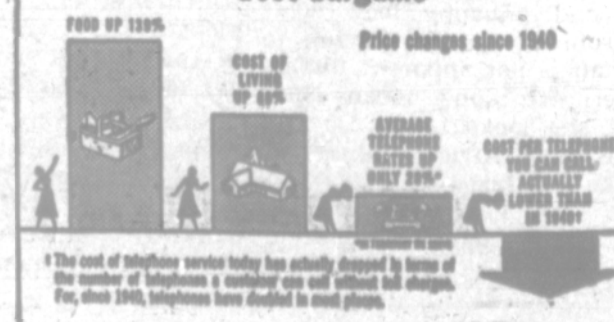
