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NEW LAWN WORK MAY BE DONE NOW

Folks planning new lawns this fall should get ambition together and get the job done. To aid in establishment, an application of fertilizer prior to planting will work wonders. A mixture of nitrogen and phosphate applied worked into the soil with a rake and watered prior to seeding is advisable. A good fertilizer for the job is 16-20 at from one to two pounds per one hundred square feet. Ammonium nitrate at one pound or Ammonium Sulfate at one and a half pounds per one hundred square feet with three pounds of superphosphate will do a nice job. Application of nitrogen fertilizer will likewise be a shot in the arms to an old lawn this fall.

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Facts You Should Know

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Electric Power Situation

1. POWER SUPPLY IS TIGHT

Rapid growth of the Pacific Northwest in population and industry has pushed the demand for electric power right up to the ceiling. The 1951-52 fall and winter season will bring a critical power shortage, unless heavy and continued rains keep the Columbia River and other power streams from going below the danger point. Even with good water conditions, the power situation is likely to be touch-and-go all through the winter period of heavy demand.

2. DEPA HAS TAKEN CHARGE

Because power supply is so closely tied with national defense, the Defense Electric Power Administration issued an order on September 17 putting all power in the area under that agency's control. DEPA will regulate the sale and the use of electricity during shortage periods. Orders of the DEPA apply to everyone—to every public and private producer or distributor of electricity, and to every individual or business using electricity.

3. YOU WILL BE NOTIFIED

Just as soon as DEPA issues any supplemental order affecting your use of electricity, you will be informed promptly, through the newspapers and radio or by mail. Then it becomes your responsibility, and the responsibility of your power supplier, to follow the rules of the game. Restrictions on the use of power will be ordered by DEPA only as actual power conditions may require, and will be relaxed as promptly as possible when the pinch is over.

4. MEANWHILE, AVOID WASTE!

You—every user of electricity—can help now to protect your power supply, and protect jobs. You can help by avoiding any waste of electricity . . . day or night. Remember, when power is short, EVERY KILOWATT COUNTS!

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
