EFFICIENCY OF
AGRICULTURE

The Oregonian in commenting editorially on the reduction in the number of farms particularly in eastern Oregon quotes census bureau figures to show the reduction in livestock numbers in Oregon while at the same time reporting a gain in dollar value of farm crops.

There is probably no generally accepted way to judge the efficiency of agriculture. Farmers are often content with the monetary returns although usually also concerned with the quality and quantity of product that indicates a pride in accomplishment.

City dwellers want the most food at the lowest price. Certain government agencies are employed to worry about use of the soil, exportable production, exchange values and the now forgotten phrase "the ever normal granary."

It is a reasonable theory that agriculture should be judged by the percentage of its product that it made available to non-farm residents. This would make a virtue of reduction in the number of farmers and make every abandoned farm house a mark of progress. That would be an economic view of the matter. The social view would be different for it would have to be concerned with the social values of land ownership, the spreading of farm income and the stability of rural population.

It is our opinion that the decline in the number of animals on farm is an indication of lowered efficiency. A part of it comes from high taxes on incomes; the farmer is like the city man when it comes to restricting output because of the small amounts remaining for the risks involved.

It is the farmers themselves who will in the long run suffer most from concentration of farms into few hands. If we are to continue establishing agricultural prices by politics and farmers come to represent a small minority of voters the future of farming is dark indeed.

The job of agriculture is to produce food and fibre for the nation and the world and the price should be sufficient that the farmer receives his just share of the nation's income for that service. Economics would be a better means of determining that share than politics, but it has become difficult to draw a line between the two.

Political factors are behind any decline in the efficiency of agriculture.

Recently we read an article in which some working humorist did his best to make fun of the vest. We say working humorist as a distinction from a spontaneous humorist, who is funnier.

One might assume that the vest as an article of wearing apparel was as decadent as new deal philosophy if he read the piece in question. Actually in the contest between the coat and the vest for favor of the human male the vest is winning. Men prefer to do without either. But when he does don some sort of modern covering for his torso it resembles a vest more than a coat.

Perhaps the heyday of the true vest was at about the same stage of what we refer to as civilization as the "what-not" which good mothers kept in the corner. Any article for which a place was not otherwise provided came to rest on the "what-not." The vest was something like that.

No man can seem so impressive peering at his wrist to learn the time of day as did the elder citizen who wore a gold chain across his impressive waist. What about the coat can indicate affluence as perfectly as a vest pocket full of long cigars?

Whether designed for it or not the vest has an effect of retaining the expanding stomach; it hides the atrocious so often sold over the necktie counter; it permits of freer movement than any garment while providing warmth. It is practical and can be pretty if there be men who want pretty vests.

NEED FOR REVISION

The census figures about agricultural production in Oregon with values of farm land and buildings give an opportunity to try to correlate such figures with the assessments made by county assessors and compiled by the state tax commission.

Naturally there is a difference in the valuations given by the 36 assessors. Conditions differ and assessors differ. To the ordinary reader it may seem puzzling that a chicken in Clatsop county is worth 20 cents and one in adjoining Columbia county is worth 60 cents or that a cow in Lincoln is worth \$28.09 and in Clackamas \$55.15. Hogs vary in value from \$5.17 to \$27.78 although we doubt the wisdom of going to Clatsop county to get one cheap.

Umatilla county's farms are valued at \$103,979,000 and the farming equipment at \$3,248,765, the land being given that value by the farmers through the census and the value of equipment being that placed by the assessor. With this Umatilla county farmers produce \$22,162,330 according to census figures. In Marion county the land is considered worth \$89,928,000 and the equipment \$1,552,780. Yet in that county the value of produce is \$24,892,007.

Value of Sherman county farm equipment is \$887,030 and the production is \$5,963,360. Yamhill county farm equipment is valued at \$877,550 and the production is \$12,679,457. In Hood River county the land is considered worth \$17,821,000 and the equipment is assessed at \$426,005 and the production is \$5,825,703. Sherman county's land is valued at \$10,322,000 from information given the census taker.

There is something wrong with valuations of farm equipment, or with figures given by farmers on value of land. It seems that there should be a close correlation between value of equipment and value of the product.

Merchandise stocks in Clackamas county are assessed at \$998,150 and the retail sales of \$50,522,000. In Coos county the stocks were assessed at \$881,500 and retail sales were \$45,413,000. In Malheur county stocks were valued at \$809,460 and sales were \$23,549,000 while the store keepers in Josephine county with stocks assessed at \$48,145 sold \$27,201,000 worth of goods.

With the probability that there will soon be a state property tax it is time the state tax commission hurried about getting some of these things corrected. The quicker way would be for the people to take an interest in themselves.

WAY TO ECONOMY

Senator Douglas of Illinois, a Democrat worries about expenses in a way that causes worry to the heads of his party. He is old fashioned enough to think that there should be economy in government.

He has tried to cut down on appropriations almost without success of any kind. Probably no individual senator or other official can reduce government expenses unless there is a change of attitude on the part of the people themselves. They cannot smugly accept doles, subsidies, grants or other moneys from the government and advocate economy. So far they have shown no inclination to stop the petty income they get from government in order to prevent the multiplication of it that corrupts the whole governments. The very system on which a democracy is based makes it hard to obtain economy. The head of a board or bureau sets up a budget which he defends

before a legislative committee the members of which are not sufficiently informed to argue long about the necessity for it. In order to prevent a general reduction in all budgets that would endanger the things in which they are interested they go along and acquiesce to the budgets of all bureaus or boards. The result is that the cost of government goes up.

The solution is for the people to demand nothing of government and send men to represent them who want nothing. A farical example is the method of putting new entertainments onto the racing fund in Oregon. When some group seems able to have a new event included many others rush to get their city's or county's event included also. The inclusion of the wheat league show at The Dalles resulted in several others getting in along with it with the result that county fairs receive considerably less than before.

Whenever the nation or any state elects a majority of its legislators who are greatly interested in economy it will be possible. As long as they elect men with orders to "get" something that will happen. And the bill will come along with it.

ALONG COMES FALL

The other morning there was frost on the roofs and that evening the air was chilly without winter clothes. The bright, warm season must be at an end.

It has been some weeks since there was the early evidence of colder weather, the heavy dew and chilled air at sun up. This time the calendar verifies it—there will be no more summer until winter has intervened.

But none can protest about the fall unless it be rain they are considering and a fast start for winter wheat. It has been warm both day and night with a few exceptions, enough to ruin late gardens in the higher part of the county.

Tomatoes still live and ripen fruit more hastily than in real summer as if informed that the season grows to an end and the job of maturing must be brought to a close.

It is a time to pile up fire wood in handy places, see that the oil drums are filled, repair the broken window, put in the late vegetables and settle down to acceptance of long evenings and dressing by artificial light.

Blackbirds will gather in groups soon and chatter wildly and the cattle will huddle on the lee of the shed and it will snow all night. Then there will be real winter.

THE DALLES DAM

Residents of the mid-Columbia area can take their hats off to Senator Guy Cordon for the appropriation for initial construction of The Dalles dam.

The \$4,000,000 is a sort of token appropriation, it is true, but it puts the dam on the books and continued appropriations are almost assured after a start is made.

Furthermore the elimination of the Ice Harbor dam indicates that congress had adopted a policy of building dams from the mouth of the river up, a theory that would not coincide with the appropriation for the Chief Joseph dam. Ice Harbor is on the Snake and was strongly opposed by fishing interests. It is now time to work to have engineers consider plans for the John Day dam at the same time as work is being done on The Dalles dam.

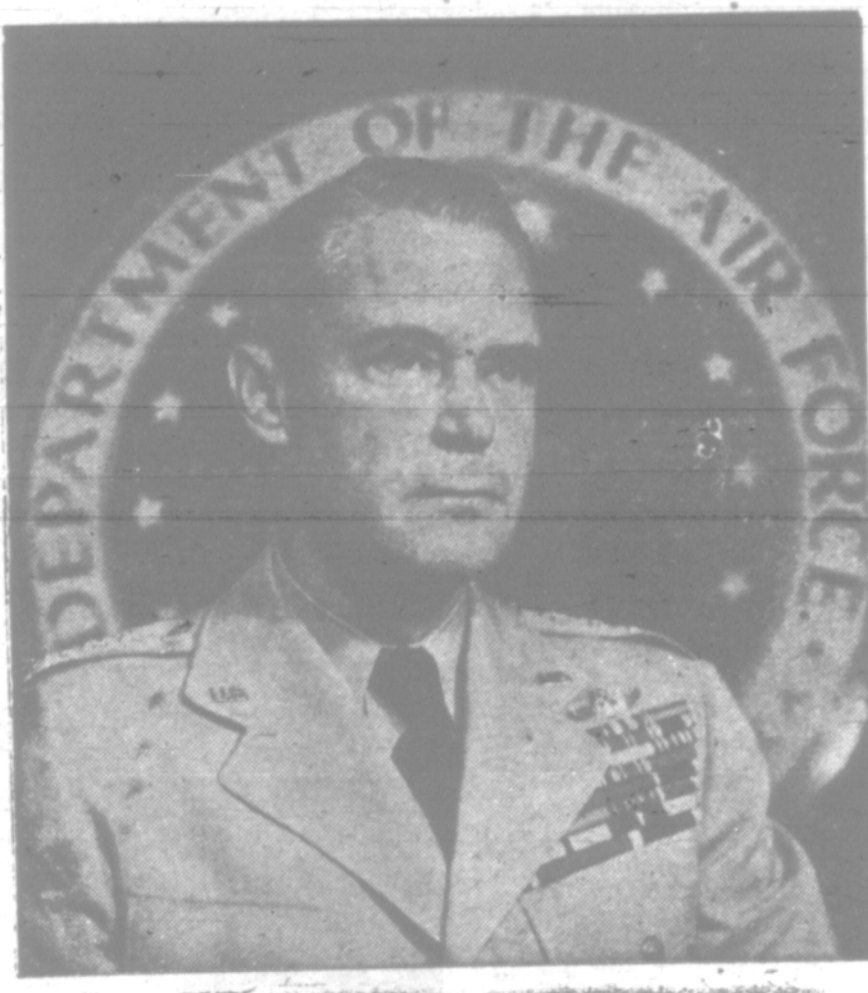
