Mrs. Freida Hammond returned to her home in Redmond Sunday after spending the weekend with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Buehler.

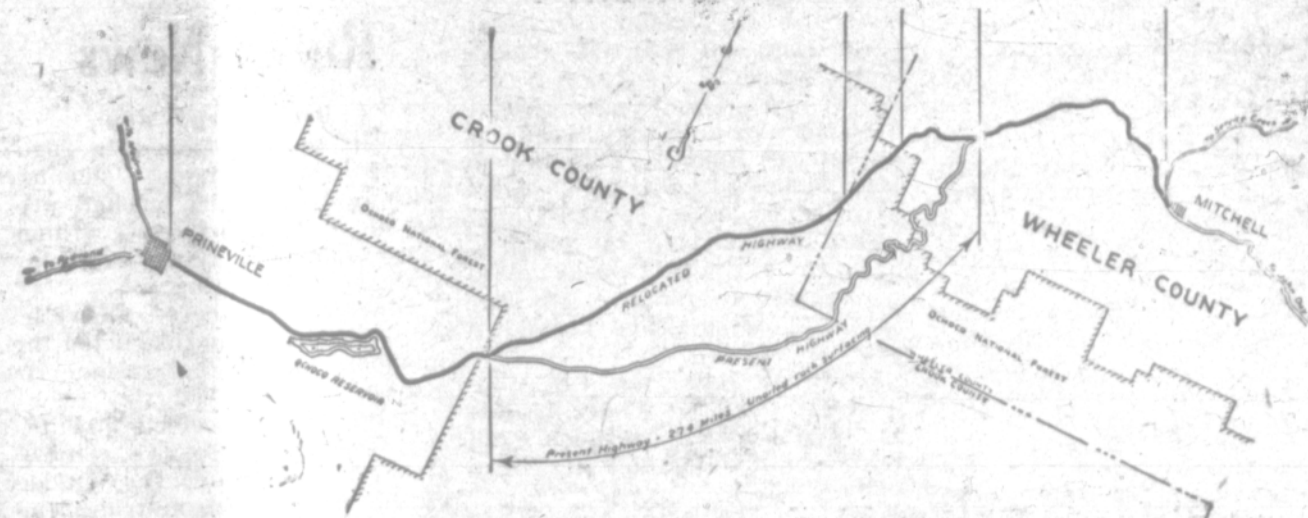
